Under this phase of the AFS program, candidates are selected for the summer program, on which they leave in June for a foreign country and spend the summer abroad as guest of some family in the country. Under the AFS school program, candidates leave in September to spend a year in a foreign country attending school and living with a family.

Summer candidates at South High are Don Strolley and Roxanne Werden. School candidates are Jo Anne Burkus and Carol Bonnette. Miss Burkus is a senior and the other three are juniors. These were chosen from the 23 applicants at South High.

Torrance High's candidates are Jack Tweedy for the summer program and John Haig

and Pamela Flemming for the Southern Hemisphere school program.

Carol Maa and Kathleen Hanson are the summer program candidates from West High school.

All candidates were selected by a panel of interviewers consisting of two educators, two civic leaders, and two AFS members. They were judged on the basis of adaptability, personality, interest in people, leadership and maturity.

Announcement of the finalists will come from AFS headquarters in New York in January or February. Finalists will be placed according to homes available overseas and the matching of student's interests with those of applying foreign families.

Miss Michele Sullivan was last year's American Abroad from the Torrance Chapter. She spent three months in Keil, Germany.
