## Championship Pair Set for Ice Capades

Barbara Wagner and Bob Paul, voted the world's greatest athletes after outdistancing competitors in the Olympic Games Pair Championships, will be seen for the first time in Long Beach when the Ice Capades opens an eight-performance engagement at the arena Tuesday.

This twosome holds not only the Olympic title, but five successive Canadian and two successive North American crowns. Barbara and Paul captured blue ribbon honors in every competition entered during the three years prior to their joining the Ice Capades.

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
