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Tribe Golfers Defend Crown

Boasting a fantastic 14-0 record in matches with Metropolitan Conference opponents as well as practice tilts, El Camino College golfers will try for their sixth straight conference victory when they meet

Long Beach tomorrow. The 1962 Metro golf champion Warriors will meet the Vikings at 1 p.m. on the Lakewood Country Club fairways.

"The conference match with Long Beach is a very important match; the Vikings are probably the strongest competitors in the Metro conference on their home course," Al Greenleaf, ECC golf coach, said.

"A WIN would put us in the driver's seat," Greenleaf added.

Playing at Kern River Country Club with winds that reached 50 mph, Warrior golfers defeated Bakersfield 39-15 last week.

Leading the Warriors, Steve Hallberg shot a 77. Dennis Drury, 78, and Dan Titus, 79, were the other low medalists for El Camino.

Jim Cottell, low scorer for the Bakersfield team, recorded a 78.

HALLBERG, the number one man on the Warrior team, recently captured the course championship at Western Avenue Country Club by defeating John Leake on the 35th hole in a 36-hole championship match.

"Under ordinary conditions the scores for Friday's match would not have been very good. Considering the wind conditions, the team played very well," coach Greenleaf commented.


SAMOHI FORCED the contest into extra innings by overcoming a one-run Saxon lead in the seventh frame.

Spartans Pull Top Shocker

Crippled South High, working without the services of three of its top sprinters, pulled off the biggest track upset of its six-year existence on Tuesday. With Lance Bennett, Chuck Hanson, and Ron Mara not competing, the Spartans registered a 56-47 victory over previously undefeated Leuzinger.

It was the first South varsity win in history over the perennially powerful Olympians.

EVEN WITH THE injured three in the meet, Leuzinger figured to come out on top, according to best times on paper. It was not to be as Bob Palmer stepped from behind the shadow of Hanson and sparked the Spartans with two first place finishes.

Palmer captured the low hurdles in a quick 20.6 seconds on the windswept South track and also picked up a first in the high hurdles with his best ever effort of 15.8 seconds.

Jeff Fleener picked up a surprise second in the century with a 10.4 clocking and wound up third in the 220 with a 23.0 effort.

South captured the Bee division 87-8 and the Spartan Cee team remained undefeated with a 58-28 triumph.

RANKING RIGHT along with Palmer's double was a tremendous shot put effort by Marty Bakker. Setting a new school record, Bakker heaved the 12-pound ball 53-11½ feet, the best distance hit this year in the South Bay area.

South gathered a sweep in the 880 as Doug Hall ran a 2:03.5 for first place. Steve Donohue and Steve Gibson followed Hall to the wire.

IN THE HIGH jump, the Spartans picked off the top two places as Gary Snellgrove, competing in his initial varsity meet, went over at 5-7 for first. John Anderson finished second. Anderson also earned a second in the broad jump with a leap of 20-9, his best jump of the year.

Wayne Wells landed South its other first place by handily winning the pole vault with a jump of 11 feet.

Upholding ECC dignity were Warrior Williams and the quick quartet composed of Jim Jones, Hawthorne; Titus Mutisya, Torrance Exchange, Kenya, Africa, visa visitor; Dick Miner, Inglewood, and Dick Brewer, Hawthorne.

Forty-six miles short of his goal, Harbor promoter Tom

Fehn, president of the Associated Men Students, relinquished his claims to fame to more durable Seahawks, one of whom completed his claim to physical fitness by crossing the finish line with five El Camino walking mates.

STARTING FROM Harbor College at 5:30 a.m., the pedestrian party put off for Huntington Beach State Park, with

the roundtrip made via Belmont Shores.

Williams clocked a sterling 12 hours and 43 minutes, two minutes less than the Jim Jones journey.

ONE HOUR following Jones' return, Mutisya and Miner marshaled muscle and might to edge out the Warrior's fifth-place contender, Dick Brewer, by exactly one hour. Brewer's

conquest of space was accomplished only after he had applied tape and removed shoes for the final 23-mile effort.

Although they had netted honors for their respective campuses, the red-footed hikers were also red-faced.

Finishing 43 minutes before any of his collegiate companions was a 57-year-old mailman, who had joined the group "just for the walk."
