



3. What means do you favor for financing new school construction? Bonds are the only fair means for financing school construction by distributing the relatively small annual cost evenly on all whose children use the schools. In a community with a population explosion such as Torrance, 30,000 students have to be housed now. Soon, we will have 35,000 or more! Our citizens have met this challenge without asking for—expensive—Federal Aid!

lishment of an extensive orientation program for teachers new to the community, with regard to both the school system and the community so that the new teacher feels welcome and wanted. Allow educators to voice their opinions with impunity. Maintain high professional standards, and pay accordingly.

1. What would your primary objective be if elected to the Board? To serve, with integrity and intelligence, the children, parents and education professionals; to do so with an open mind, seeking the facts on all sides, and to reach decisions in the best interests of the children. To provide a channel of communications which will allow all parties to an issue to speak with impunity—the Board serving as a buffer, but retaining the ultimate authority. To bring to the Board a sound business background focused upon cost control and capital expenditures, and an appreciation of scientific skills required of youngsters for technical careers.

C) Budget Allotments. Similar to 2 A) above, except motions and vote casting would be in regard to budget items and would perhaps add, delete or adjust budget allotments. Particular attention should be focused on items which do not directly contribute to education of the children or are in some other way a necessary part of the budget. The expansion of maintenance cost in the past two years warrants particular surveillance.

2. How do you think a School Board member can promote improvements in the following areas of education?

D) Summer School Program. Work to achieve an understanding of which phases of the summer program are of absolute necessity (and why). Seek to eliminate those phases (and associated cost) which are not necessary. Seek to provide adequate incentive to the children to satisfactorily complete requirements during the normal school session. Keep the summer sessions centralized.

A) Curriculum. Once convinced of the possibility for improvement, the Trustee may: Make a motion and cast a vote in favor of an adjustment in the local curriculum, or controlling the finance available for instruction in certain areas of the curriculum; Seek to speak before local groups of citizens and professionals, in an effort to explain his position and to encourage support; Utilize the mass communication media; If he seeks to editorialize in the bulletins of a public agency, he should promote equal exposure for the opposing point of view.

E) Special Services. Work to winnow the wheat from the chaff, the truly worthwhile from the frill. Where such services are paid for from the general funds but utilized by only a few, either promote their elimination or place them on a user-financed basis.

B) Obtaining and Retaining a High Caliber of Teachers. Work to control costs so that school revenues can be applied to maintaining better-than-average teacher salaries. If financially feasible, establish an educational reimbursement program for advanced training of both teachers and administrators. Promote the estab-

3. What do you favor for financing new school construction? The first step in selecting the appropriate type of school construction financing is to determine how much financing is needed. This calls for a long range construction plan and astute cost estimation that trims the fat from school construction. Having settled upon the approximate amounts of absolute expenditures over a period of years, I would then favor the type of funds provisioning which produces the necessary monies at the necessary times and at the lowest cost to the individual citizens. At the same time, I would seek for funding which minimizes the relinquishing of control on the local level.
