

Proposed Amendments Set Up Special Court

On Wednesday, April 3, I introduced three Assembly Joint Resolutions petitioning Congress to propose, or call a convention to propose, three amendments to the U.S. Constitution. These are Assembly Joint Resolutions 35, 36, and 37.

Assembly Joint Resolution 35 petitions Congress to propose an amendment to the United States Constitution to require that proposed constitutional amendments be submitted to the legislatures of the several states automatically upon application of two-thirds of the legislatures containing identical texts of a proposed amendment.

Assembly Joint Resolution 36 petitions Congress to propose or call a convention to propose amendments to the Constitution abolishing judicial jurisdiction in controversies relating to apportionments of state legislatures and exempting such apportionments from restrictions or limitations imposed by the United States Constitution.

Assembly Joint Resolution 37 petitions Congress to propose or call a convention to propose an amendment to the Constitution to establish a Court of the Union. Under this amendment, any U.S. Supreme Court decision relating to the rights of the people or the states under the Constitution would be reviewed by a special Court composed of the Chief Justices of the highest appellate courts of each of the 50 states.

IN CALIFORNIA, the Chief Justice of the California State Supreme Court would be one of the fifty voting justices of the Court of the Union. This Court of the Union would sit

Rabbi Front Earns PhD. In Religion

Rabbi Henri E. Front, spiritual leader of Temple Menorah of Redondo Beach, has earned a doctorate at the California school of the Hebrew Union College—Jewish Institute of Religion. The degree will be awarded during commencement ceremonies in June.

Rabbi Front came to Temple Menorah two years ago, after serving with the U.S. Navy. He was ordained at the Cincinnati School of the Hebrew College in 1955.

The degree, a Doctor of Hebrew Letters, is the only doctorate to be awarded this year by the Institute. Rabbi Front's dissertation was on the Midrash Rabah, a five volume work on the Book of Moses. He took his oral examinations on March 12.

ECC Students Hear Benefits Of Teaching

Benefits of a teaching career were related to El Camino College students the past week by Dr. Frederick Hile, commissioner of higher education affiliated with the California Teachers Assn.

"Teaching is an art," Dr. Hile emphasized to the Camino student chapter of CTA. He predicted that in the future, microfilms, tapes, and other teaching devices will partially compensate for the great lack of qualified teachers at every grade level.

Dr. Hile reminded listeners that a teacher affects eternity and one can never know where his influence stops.

He taught speech and psychology on the El Camino campus prior to taking a leave of absence from the college. Dr. Hile has been on the CTA staff for the past four years and has visited and evaluated operational facilities in junior colleges all over the state.

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in judgment on the Supreme Court decisions. The sole issue of this special Court of the Union would decide whether the power of jurisdiction sought to be exercised on the part of the United States is a power granted to it under the Constitution.

This Court of the Union would require 26 judges to overturn a U.S. Supreme Court decision under the above specified conditions.

ALREADY THERE IS in existence a Council of State Governments, to which each of the 50 states sends delegates.

California voted yes on each of the three proposed constitutional amendments described above, and an overwhelming majority of the 50 states voted yes on all three. Hence, these three Assembly Joint Resolutions of mine are not something cooked up hurriedly. They reflect the considered opinion of thousands of experts.
