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Law in Action

California's growing population demands more and more schools, parks, highways, and assorted public services. Often the state will build big universities, colleges, or other institutions, and whole new cities will spring about them. Land goes up in price.

THE STATE BUYS land through eminent domain. In this procedure it has to show that the taking is necessary for public use. It can buy whole parcels of land instead of just parts, if the cost is not much greater than the cost of taking a smaller part.

As a rule how much land the government takes is for the Legislature, the boards of supervisors, city councils or other agencies to say. When they abuse discretion a private owner can claim "excess condemnation"—that the land is not needed for public use. What is a public need or public use is usually a legislative matter. It is hard to upset that determination unless there is a clear abuse.


BUT THE government cannot just condemn land and hold it for speculation for price increase alone, even though the state officials may well know they could sell it at a profit and thus cut the cost of the needed land.

The state brings condemnation proceedings to get a court to say what to pay for the property it wants. Government may regulate use of private property in the public interest which is different legally from taking it. Thus, in building a college, the state may also set rules for private housing for students or prohibit certain types of business along highways.
