

Compton Cup Again Draws Three Local Track Squads

Rained out last week, the annual Compton Cup will again lure track squads from North, Torrance, and South high schools this weekend.

The rugged meet, comprised of the top prep squads in Southern California, will get underway at 7:30 p.m.

All three local schools will be hard put to field teams offering top performances because of difficulties in scheduling. West and Torrance will have just competed in the Pioneer League preliminaries tomorrow while South will be "fresh" from an expected rugged battle with Morningside under the lights.

SOUTH COACH Dick Scully has selected six individual varsity performers for action and two Bee relay teams.

Bruce Hamilton, the school's distance king, will run in either the mile or 880 depending on whether he is pushed

tomorrow night. Should Hamilton be extended, he will go in the half mile where he will post a top time of 2:01.9. In the mile, the junior flash has a best of 4:30.

DAVE LEDFORD, with a top effort of 4:36, will run in the four-lapper. Bob Dobbie and Steve Donohue, with identical best efforts of 52.8 seconds, will enter the quarter mile. Doug Hall will go in the half mile and posts a top time of 2:01.3.

In the Bee 660 relay, South will team Alan Cridbring, Bob Johnson, Ron Mara, and Randy Siller. In the medley relay, Cridbring, Mara, Siller, and Wes Fox will run.

NORTH COACH Howard Smith will drop his top varsity sprinters down in the Bee division in the hope of picking up a win. Alan Johnson, Pete Molina, Bruce Allen, and either

Stan Ferris or John Rance will go in the 660-yard relay.

Sophomore half-miler Bob Hansen will be let loose in the open 880 to see what he can do against some fast company. Hansen appears ready to snap the two-minute mark.

TORRANCE MENTOR Joe Sarthou will go with a strong distance crew. Dennis Dyer and Ivor Sampson will take a crack at the mile. Sampson has a best of 4:31.8 while Dyer has turned the four laps in 4:33.4.

Junior Larry Parker will put his best 880 time of 2:02.8 on the line. Sarthou will also enter a Bee relay team, and will

Ellsworth Horses Go at Hollypark

The stable of Rex C. Ellsworth, which last year set a Hollywood Park record for money earned in a single season, will defend its championship at the 55-day meeting which opens May 9.

Twenty-five head belonging to the Chino owner-breeder are now bedded down at the Inglewood track.

The Ellsworth string, which last year with \$1,154,454 became only the third stable in racing history to exceed a million dollars in earnings in a single year, collected nearly half of its total at Hollywood Park by winning \$521,125.

Lynn Boice, long-time aide to Trainer Mish Tenny, is conditioning the string while Tenny is in Kentucky preparing the stable's undefeated three-year-old Candy Spots for his Derby engagement May 4.

Sweeping two straight to complete dual match competition with an 11-3 mark, El Camino College's tennis squad finished Metropolitan Conference action in second place behind powerful San Diego.

In the final two matches of the season, the Warrior racquetmen downed Long Beach 7-2, and drubbed Santa Monica 8-1.

The Tribe netmen will travel to Ojai, for the annual tennis spectacular held there this weekend.

WITH A team consisting almost entirely of freshmen, coach Manahan, in his second year as ECC tennis mentor, brought his racquet squad a step higher in the Metro standings.

The tennis squad finished third last season.

Cycles Go At Ascot Tomorrow

Ralph White of San Diego, winner of the 200-mile national road race last month at Daytona Beach, has joined the motorcycle flat-track campaigners at Ascot Park, and will be in a top field tomorrow night.

White, a student of San Diego State College, successfully combines his collegiate career with motorcycle racing and currently tops Grand National AMA point standings.

He finished fifth in 1962, missing fourth place by only seven points.

Along with Jack O'Brien of Santa Monica and Al Gunter of Alhambra, White will be against such oval track whizzers as Neil Keen, Pasadena; Sammy Tanner, Bellflower; Stu Morley, Los Angeles; Don Hawley, Inglewood; Dick Hammer, Lakewood; and Mert Lawwill, Gardena, Friday night.

Race director J. C. Agajanian reports an all-time record field of 101 riders from all points of the west ready for the 18-event program that starts at 8:30 p.m. One-lap qualifying begins at 7 p.m.

SEPARATE HEATS and finals will be held for all three AMA divisions, expert, amateur and novice, culminating in a triple main event.

Agajanian announces that several eastern riders will be appearing soon in Friday night races at Ascot in preparation for the eight-mile national championships, billed July 26 on the Gardena track.

RACQUET SWINGERS from high schools, two-year colleges and four-year colleges and universities will vie in their respective classes in the Ojai court test.

Losing only three matches in Metro action this season, two to champion San Diego and one to Santa Monica, the Warriors won their last eight tilts.

FOLLOWING the Ojai tourney, the Tribe will compete in the Metro conference championships May 3 and 4. The loop play-offs will be hosted by the Warriors.

Showing improvement in their final tilt with SMCC, the Tribe netmen took eight of the nine matches.

JAMIE COLLACO, number one man for El Camino and Coach Paul Manahan's top scorer throughout the season, was the only Warrior tasting defeat in the final match as he lost 4-6, 8-6, 2-6.

Collaco, a freshman stand-out, emerged from a host of newcomers to capture the premier slot on the Tribe net squad this season.

Warrior Spikers End Frustration

Three months of unabridged frustration came to an end Tuesday when the El Camino track squad closed out its 1963 Metropolitan Conference dual meet schedule at San Diego City College.

Prior to their pilgrimage to

the Border City, the Warriors "boasted" a 1-5 conference record.

El Camino's final home contest of the season resulted in an 87½-34½ annihilation at the hands of conference champion Long Beach City College.

JOE LANNING'S undefeated Vikings (6-0) commanded 12 of the 14 first place honors, with Terry Hendrix scoring an impressive triple and Tim Russell and Bill Pace each nabbing twin victories.

Hendrix clicked off the 120 low hurdles in :15.1, the 220 high hurdles in :24.2 and captured the broad jump with a 22'2½" effort.

RUSSELL RACED to his unusual double, winning the 100 and 220-yard dashes in :09.7 and :21.8, while Pace "muscled" to triumph in the shot put, 54'8½", and the discus, 140'4½".

Only winner for the Warriors was miler Kurt Klein, who snared his event with an outstanding 4:19.7 clocking.

EL CAMINO'S powerful relay quartet remained undefeated this year by upending Long Beach's previously unconquerable foursome in 3:26.0. Les Hayes, Wilbert Wade, Mike Kelley and Klein made up the winning combination.

Top effort during the meet was turned in by Long Beach pole vaulter John Champion, who soared over the bar at 14 ft. 4 in. and narrowly missed at 15 feet.

The Vikings' mighty high jumper, John Rambo came up short of expectations, although winning the event with a 6 ft. 5½ in. effort, five inches shy of his top jump for the season.

Harvey Appoints Speedway Driver

Speedway veteran Bill Cheesbourg will drive one of the rear-engine Harvey Aluminum Specials at Indianapolis next month, car builder Mickey Thompson confirmed today.

An experienced campaigner on the national racing circuit, "Cheese" has competed in four 500 milers, placing 10th in 1958. During the racing season last year, he won the 150 mile stock car race at Langhorne, Pa., and the 100 lap stock car race at Clovis, Calif., and ranked sixth in USAC

point standings in national stock car competition.

In March of this year, he placed first in the 100 mile Concord, N.C., stock car race.

"Bill's natural driving ability and his experience at Indianapolis are what we need on the team," said Thompson.

"He'll be in a familiar car and make no mistake about his car being the 1962 model. It's been completely redone—new engine, new suspension, rack-and-pinion steering, one-sided fuel tank, aluminum disc brakes, new paneling and under tray, and much more."

Other pilots signed for the five-car Harvey factory team are 1962 world driving champion Graham Hill, Grand Prix driver Masten Gregory, and Bill Krause of sports car racing fame.

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
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
