Torrance Drivers Race on Saturday

Three Torrance drivers will take a crack at the Anything Goes race Saturday night at Western Speedway. Ray Camp, Bud Jackson, and Willy Kimbrough will compete on the figure eight track at 7:30 p.m.

Auto Defects Factor In Highway Accidents

A 1961 California Highway Patrol study showing that more than four per cent of the drivers in fatal accidents were operating vehicles with a defect has been cited as among reasons for mandatory inspection of all vehicles in the state.

If mechanical defects are responsible for four per cent of the accidents, up to 165 lives annually might be saved, as many as 7,387 injuries might be prevented and as much as \$24,000,000 might be saved, a county supervisor said.

"IF ALL California motor vehicles were tested today, probably 50 per cent would be found unsafe in the critical areas of brakes, lights and steering," Supervisor Kenneth Hahn added.

As various governmental officials called for a mandatory inspection, Mrs. Evelyn S. Radford, Torrance Traffic Safety Council spokesman, called attention to free automobile safety checks to be given from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Saturday, May

25, and Sunday, May 26, at three locations in the city.


THE LOCATIONS will be the City Hall parking lot, Torrance Boulevard and Maple Avenue, the Bank of America parking lot at Sepulveda Boulevard and Hawthorne Avenue and at AResearch parking lot on 190th Street, just east of Crenshaw Boulevard.

The Junior Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring a seat belt clinic at the same time and locations.

"Most defects are unknown to drivers. A proven inspection program would disclose them—perhaps in time to save a life," Hahn emphasized.

THE STATES of Massachusetts, New Jersey and Pennsylvania have mandatory inspection programs. The death rate per 100 million miles in California is 92.9 per cent higher than in Massachusetts, 80 per cent higher than New Jersey and 17.3 per cent higher than Pennsylvania.

Law in Action

American Indians are the only 100 per cent native Americans; many thousands of them are coming to live in California these days.

1. Indian matters come under Federal law and the terms are of some 3,900 Indian treaties which are also the law of the land.

Thus long ago Rev. Samuel Worcester, preaching to the Cherokees, refused to take out a license, and to swear allegiance to the State of Georgia. When Georgia jailed him for not taking the loyalty oath, the U. S. Supreme Court freed him: The court would allow no state to interfere in United States Indian affairs which our treaties governed.

IN 1834 Congress set up the Bureau of Indian Affairs to make and carry out rules made under these treaties.

2. Until the Civil War, the Federal Government regarded Indians as wards and dependent nations—foreign nations, yet under U. S. control. In 1871, however, Congress de-

clared that Indian nations were no longer dependent. Indians still ran their own affairs for the most part, as illustrated in a case titled In Re Crow Dog.

In 1883 Crow Dog killed another Sioux for stealing a friend's wife. Crow Dog made amends under tribal law, and the tribe closed his case. Soon afterwards Federal officers sought to try him for murder, but the Supreme Court said no: Such cases did come under tribal law and this one had been settled.

Shortly afterward Congress gave Federal courts jurisdiction over most criminal cases on Indian territories. Accordingly, just the other day the U. S. Supreme Court invalidated the conviction of a California Indian for murder. He must face trial in a Federal court instead.

4. Indian tribal courts still try some criminal cases; and within the tribes, tribal law still holds. For example, they can tax and license traders on reservations.
