Garden Checklist

1. Among the bedding plants you can set out for quick color are dwarf dahlias, marigolds, zinnias, asters, petunias, stocks, snapdragons and ageratum.
2. Roses are now coming into bloom, or soon will be. There's no better time to select the varieties you want. They are available in cans at your nursery.
3. Mulch around camellias with two or three inches of leaf mold or peat moss. In warm areas it will keep the ground cool and moist.
4. Pinch back new chrysanthemum plants when you set them out and continue pinching the new growth until July. This makes bushy, sturdy plants. Fertilize regularly.
5. Tomato plants can be set out now. Pepper plants are also available for use in a warm, sunny spot in the garden.

The week begins with the 143rd anniversary of the birth of Florence Nightingale, regarded as the founder of modern hospital teaching, and will honor the theme of "Today's Hospital—Career Center for America's Youth."

A. L. Thomas, Harbor General administrator, has pointed out that the week's theme is in keeping with the accreditation of Harbor.

"We are a teaching hospital," he said, "training not only doctors and professional nurses, but licensed vocational nurses, nurse's aides, X-ray technicians, laboratory technicians, occupational and physical therapists, to name a few."

"In the professional areas the courses are part of the general courses at UCLA, El Camino and Harbor Colleges."

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
