Beverage Retailers Oppose Pricing Bill

A. D. Murrell, president of the California Beverage Retailers Assn., has commended Governor Brown for taking a stand against Senator McAteer's controversial Senate Bill 752, the liquor profit markup bill.

"Our association was disturbed when Senator McAteer claimed that Governor Brown would support this bill, because it seeks to achieve guaranteed profits for liquor dealers similar to those in a bill which Governor Brown pocket vetoed in 1959," Murrell said. "We were pleased to see the governor take a decisive stand when he said last week, 'I vetoed it once before and I'd like to know the reasons why I should change my mind on it.'"

Murrell pointed out that Senate Bill 752 guarantees a liquor store retailer a 21 per cent markup on distilled spirits and further guarantees an 8 per cent markup to liquor wholesalers.

"THIS IS an attempt to raise prices to the consumer by eliminating private label brands," Murrell said. "Why should those consumers who do not want it be required to pay for the cost of national advertising?"

In 1959, Governor Brown in vetoing similar price-fixing legislation in the liquor field, stated in his veto message, "This in effect, would be a tax on consumers. The state has never taken any action of this kind on any other commodity — to guarantee a specific markup, and consequently, a specific profit. Why should the liquor store operator have a guarantee of a profit when the hardware store operator does not? In either case, it would be the consumer who pays."

MURRELL urged that members of the assembly unite behind Governor Brown in opposing SB 752. It has passed the Senate.

The California Beverage Retailers Assn. also opposes Assembly Bill 1241, according to Murrell. "This bill is a sleeper," Murrell said, "it pretends merely to increase the price of liquor licenses. A careful reading, however, discloses that in the fine print it attempts to establish a legislative policy that lower liquor prices cause

intemperance." Murrell added, "We should not raise liquor prices in order to give a greater profit to the liquor industry. High prices are no cure for intemperance. Rather they encourage bootlegging which is on the increase in California even now."

Murrell said he hoped that the members of the Legislature would read the fine print before voting on this bill.

THE CALIFORNIA Beverage Retailers Assn. is composed of a group of drug and grocery store owners. According to Murrell, this organization is pledged to see that the liquor business is kept clean of legislative favoritism to special interest groups.

"We do not see why our liquor departments should be subsidized," Murrell said. "We are willing to let competition guarantee the consumer a fair shake on liquor prices just as it does in our other departments."

Murrell pointed out that an attempt to limit competition is not an attempt to build better morals in the consuming public.
