(Continued From Page 1) and labor organizations, and from its free political institutions," he told the large luncheon gathering.

He said this strength is one no totalitarian government can ever hope to equal.

AMERICA'S tremendous program of defense strength is for one purpose only, he said. That is "to offset the potentially aggressive power of nations opposed to our way of life."

He cited the need for a substantial pay raise for the armed forces, saying it was well-earned and necessary.

The important period of enlistment, the first re-enlistment bridge, is one that needs bolstering, he told newsmen earlier Saturday. It costs from \$2,500 to \$10,000 to train a technician, he pointed out, and in many cases they leave the

service just when their skills could be put to use. If they re-enlist, once, there's a good chance they'll make a career of military service, he said.

THE SECRETARY held out no hope for a quick settlement of the world's problems, saying the struggle that America and its allies are in today with the Communist nations "is not the kind of struggle which will be quickly won."

He said this is something that should be understood following 18 years of cold war which were preceded by five years of "the most terrible war in mankind's history."

He said it was natural that we should look around for some relief, but "we dare not indulge it." He pointed out that the Communists look at the struggle in terms of historic eras.
