Century of Designer Fashions On Display

A survey of French and American fashions over a 100-year period comprises the "Transitions in Styles" at the Los Angeles County Museum. On view are 27 exemplary costumes from the museum's collection representing the period from 1880 to 1960.

According to Stefanie P. Holt, curator of costumes and textiles of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, the exhibits illustrate the evolution of style trends from one decade to another. Among the exquisite gowns on view will be creations by Paul Poiret, considered the "King of Fashion" at the beginning of the

20th Century, and his contemporary Paquin. Favorite designers of the 1930s were Jean Patou and Vionnet, who followed such internationally recognized names as Boue Soeurs, Chanel and Callot Soeurs, whose labels are found on jeweled dresses of the 1920s.

Earliest gown in the exhibition is dated 1880 and was created by Worth, designer for Empress Eugenie of France, and the first couturier to sew labels in his creations. Latest gowns in the display are recent creations by Balenciaga.

Also represented in the exhibition are such prominent American designers as Irene, Adrian and Galanos. The museum is open daily except Monday from 10 to 5 p.m. Admission is free. The current exhibit will continue through June 30.
