

Law in Action

Our laws have long protected trees. A landowner, for example, can collect treble damages from a trespasser who cuts down trees, not his own, a kind of civil penalty against such a trespasser.

Judges do not levy the treble damages unless the trespasser acted with malice. Otherwise they make him repay only actual losses.

In a recent case Mrs. Jones, an elderly widow, owned some land with a stand of trees. Her son looked after the land, but now and then he would let a neighbor, Charles Cutter, chop down some of the trees.

MRS. JONES sold the land to the Smiths. Though Charles knew of the sale, he nevertheless cut down some trees without permission.

Eleanor Roosevelt's Era Reviewed by Close Friend

In the late 1920's (an actor friend once told me), Helen Gahagan was known around Broadway as "the ten most beautiful women in New York." She left the theater not long after her marriage to the actor, Melvyn Douglas, and settled in Hollywood. Always active in Democratic party politics, she was a Democratic National Committee-woman from California. She soared into further prominence when she was elected a "Congresswoman in the early 1940's."

Mrs. Douglas first met Eleanor Roosevelt in 1929, when the wife of the Governor of New York. But it was during the last 20 years of Mrs. Roosevelt's life that the two ladies were particularly warm friends. It is upon this relationship that Mrs. Douglas has built a moving and eloquent text for a picture album titled "The Eleanor Roosevelt We Remember."

The Eleanor Roosevelt We Remember. By Helen Gahagan Douglas. Hill & Wang: 173 pp.; \$5.95.

This is by no means a formal biography. In fact, it merely skips the highlights of Mrs. Roosevelt's own autobiography. It is a short, digni-

fic, personal view and appreciation of a friend and enormously human public figure. Some 150 photographs edited by Aaron J. Erickson, follow the text. They are arranged in chronological order, beginning in 1888, when, at the age of 4, Anna Eleanor Roosevelt was a shy, solemn child.

Some notes from Mrs. Douglas' unusually interesting text:

"I can't think of anyone else in a waist and skirt, the way she often dressed, being so grand."

"I hear her advising me: 'You mustn't let Franklin influence you, Helen. He thinks it would be nice to have you in Washington. Don't you run for Congress unless you're very sure you'll be elected.'"

... "To the end of her life, Mrs. Roosevelt gave her name whenever she thought 'he force of it would break through some of the wall of prejudice or ignorance that divided people.'"

... "Eleanor Roosevelt, the breaker of feminine barriers, was the most feminine of women. She was always what you expected her to be — courageous, forthright, uncomplicatedly honest. She could be counted on."

... "During her last years, Mrs. Roosevelt seemed to withdraw from us, although she kept going, observing all the forms and performing all the rituals of her life — her sweetness and warmth, as always, the same."
