## Navy Tracking System Contract Awarded Aeronca

A prime contract for design and construction of a complete tracking antenna system has been awarded to Aeronca Manufacturing Corp. by the Office of Naval Research. The contract is for \$1,625,872.

The primary work of the large antenna dish and related electronic equipment will be done at the Middletown, Ohio, and Baltimore, Md., plants.

The system will be used for space tracking and communications. In addition to the prime contract, a \$230,000 contract for a facility to house the system was also awarded to Aeronca.

Mrs. Rotman died June 12 at an Inglewood hospital. She had lived in the area for the past 14 years.


She is survived by a son, Ralph of Gardena; a daughter, Gladys Dussell of Los Angeles; four grandchildren; and 10 great-grandchildren.

group, is the passing of the absolute.

There is conscious effort by some persons to destroy standards by saying "there is no lasting truths or values in the arts, science, education, and government."

Rafferty quoted Mark Twain to illustrate his point. "If you don't like it now, wait a while," he quoted.

**ANSWERING** A question from the floor, Rafferty described group psychological testing of high school students as "quackery and money-making gimmicks." He explained that not one reputable psychiatrist supports the use of group psychological tests.

Concluding, Rafferty told the group that while he is state superintendent, the trend in California will be toward "education in depth." He explained that by this he meant that the disciplines of subject matter should be emphasized, that it should be comprehensive and interesting, and that students should be encouraged to study hard and work.

**HOMEWORK SHOULD** return to vogue, Rafferty said. "Homework teaches the student to work independently. Students should learn the best, not the worst there is to be learned."

On teachers, Rafferty remarked that teachers should instill their students with understanding of truth, justice, courage, responsibility, love of country and virtue. "That's education in depth," he said, "and we must have more of it."
