

Varied Summer Planned For Torrance Residents

Registration information for special summer activities sponsored by the Torrance Recreation Dept. was announced this week by activities coordinators. Many youngsters have already registered for the many activities to be offered this summer. Registration for the programs is still open. Registration for space age Junior cook classes for boys,

dog obedience classes, fun through music programs, and Chippewa Pow Wow Day will be accepted at the Recreation Dept. office. Adult golf lessons will be held at Sea-Aire course, and adults may register for classes at the park. All other programs will permit registration at the first session. Brochures describing the complete summer program may be obtained from the Recreation Dept. office at the City Hall, and at all parks.

\$3.8 Million Project Set for Flood Control

Work on another link in the 18-mile Dominguez Channel flood control project is slated to start soon following approval of plans and specifications for the project, Supervisor Burton W. Chace reported yesterday. Estimates place cost of the new unit at about \$3.8 million. The Board of Supervisors directed that bids for the work be opened July 19 in the offices of Flood Control District Chief Engineer M. E. Salsbury.

Formal award of a contract to the low bidder is slated about ten days later Chace said. IT WILL CALL for improvement of the channel from Wilmington Avenue to Avalon Boulevard, installation of right-of-way fencing and an access road along the watercourse from Henry Ford Avenue to Wilmington Avenue and construction of an outlet structure for a line of the South Torrance Storm Drain at Carson Street.

Work will involve building a reinforced concrete trapezoidal channel stretching over a mile and a half. The fencing will be undertaken along a unit which is currently under construction. The contractor is expected to start work within two or three weeks after award of a contract by the Supervisors and completion is slated late in 1965. DOMINGUEZ Channel is an

integral part of the drainage program in the southwest section of the County, Chace explained. It acts as an outlet for storm drains and, when completed, will carry flood waters from Inglewood to the harbor. The channel is being improved in units by the Flood Control District as funds become available. Completion of the entire watercourse is tentatively scheduled for mid-1966, the Supervisor said. Plans for the new unit were

drawn by Flood Control District design engineers. County Engineer John A. Lambie was responsible for design of the unit of the South Torrance Storm Drain. FLOOD CONTROL District personnel will oversee construction and operate and maintain the structures upon completion. Funds to finance the Dominguez Channel work will be provided from the District's reg-

ular flood control tax while the storm drain work will be paid for from the \$225 million bond issue approved by the voters in 1958, Chace added.

Law in Action

No man can serve two masters, so the saying goes, especially in government. Government employers cannot do business for the government with firms in which they have a financial stake.

Thus no city purchasing officer can deal with a firm which he owns, no matter how fair and honest the contract may be.

THE RULE sometimes makes it hard to get the best people in government work. Joe Biggs, a dairyman, was a useful man for the school board because of his wide business experience. So the people elected him.

Yet in any school milk or butter purchases, Biggs had to pass on his own firm's bids. Since Biggs could not afford to lose this business, he resigned, and the school lost a valued officer.

THE LAWS against "conflicts of interest" are broad. Under the law an officer (and sometimes a person who works under him) "cannot be permitted to place himself in any situation where his personal interest will conflict with his faithful performance of his duty."

One board of supervisors contracted with the Ajax Road Builders which rented big road machinery from Jones & Smith Rentals. Board member Smith voted on the contract. The court called this a conflict of interest, and cancelled the contract.

IN ANOTHER case a school board member was also an insurance broker for the Safety Bus Company. The Board contracted with Safety Bus to haul students but made it increase its insurance as the student passengers increased in number. The Board member could and did get more insurance commissions. Again the court blew the whistle. The Board member quit office.

As a rule, where an official's interests are remote, there is less likelihood of a challenge if he discloses his interest and takes no part in getting the contract or voting on it.
