Construction Started for New Center

Ground breaking ceremonies for the first unit of a new half million dollar shopping center in Torrance were held Tuesday morning. The new center, located at Sepulveda Boulevard and Cabrillo Avenue, will be known as Sepulveda Plaza.

The first unit will be the Alpha Beta market, and additional commercial buildings and a coffee shop will be constructed at a later time.

The center is being developed by the Kergan Development Co., and construction will be done by Ernest W. Hahn, Inc. Hugh Gibbs, A.I.A., designed the center.

In addition to the supermarket and commercial shops, there will be parking for 170 cars. Completion of the unit is expected to take about four months.

Ex-Herald Mechanical Chief Dies

Funeral services for Clay B. Carley, 58, former composing room foreman for The Torrance HERALD, were held in San Mateo Monday. Mr. Carley died late last week following an illness of several months.

Mr. Carley came to The HERALD on May 26, 1952, from the Santa Rosa Press-Democrat where he was mechanical superintendent for three years.

He was a native of Cross Timbers, Mo., and moved with his parents to Modesto, Calif., as an infant. He served as an apprentice and a printer at the Modesto News beginning in 1921. He later served as foreman at a Santa Cruz newspaper for five years, at Eureka for eight years, at the Santa Rosa Press-Democrat and The HERALD. He left Torrance in 1957 to become mechanical superintendent at the San Mateo Daily Times, where he was employed until his death.


MR. CARLEY was a member of the Torrance Rotary Club while here, and he and his wife, Grace, were active in several Torrance organizations. He was a member of the Modesto Masonic Lodge and of the 32nd Degree Scottish Rite Consistory of San Jose.

He served twice as Patron of the Camilla Chapter of the Order of the Eastern Star in Eureka and Mrs. Carley as matron of the chapter in 1949.


