

# Hahn Seeks Extension Of Project

Procedures are now in motion to re-establish the special water replenishment zone in the west basin area, Supervisor Kenneth Hahn has announced. The county counsel has been directed to prepare resolutions and set in motion the procedures for a public hearing. The zone includes most of the southwestern area of the county, including Torrance and surrounding areas. The zone was established in 1954, an extension for an additional five years by a vote of the supervisors in 1959. The new action would extend the zone through 1967. A five per cent tax per \$100 valuation is levied within the zone to finance the projects under the flood control district. A prime project in the zone is the construction of a barrier to prevent further brine intrusion from San Pedro Bay, said Hahn.

Directors from the colleges: Miss Roberta Lindberg, RN, chairman, division of Nursing, Harbor College; and Mrs. Cynthia Barnes, RN, coordinator of nursing, El Camino College; met with Mrs. Bernadine Clark, RN, HGH director of nursing, and Miss Lucy Palermi, RN, education director, nursing, Harbor General, recently to schedule the fall program. "Nursing is a satisfying profession and one in which employment is always obtainable. I would recommend the "undecided" high school graduate, considering a college program, take a long look at the professional nursing program planned between the two colleges and Harbor General."

**THE NURSING** schedule is of two calendar year duration and will include clinical experiences in other neighboring hospitals in medical, surgical, pediatric, psychiatric, and obstetric patient care.

**"HARBOR COLLEGE** is looking forward to enrolling 60 student nurses who will be utilizing the modern facilities in this less-than-a-year-old hospital," Miss Lindberg said. "We are anticipating a class of 40 from El Camino," Mrs. Barnes declared, "and we already know that the HGH clinical facilities are highly regarded." September will mark the second semester El Camino has participated in the program.

Presiding at the meeting, Mrs. Clark stated, "Harbor General Hospital is a teaching hospital and we welcome addition of Harbor College students to the roles of those from El Camino."
