radio, which normally plays music, announced the shooting. The lunch hour was extended while the students listened to the sad news.

At other schools in Torrance, much the same reaction set in. Students returned to classes, but their hearts and minds were somewhere else. Students at Catholic schools in the city began to pray for the President, while others simply hung their heads and cried softly.

Throughout the city, the reaction was one of stunned disbelief.

"It still seems like a bad dream," businessman Gene DeBra said Saturday.

That feeling was still being expressed late Saturday as the meaning of the events of the previous 24 hours came into focus.

"It just left an empty feeling in my stomach," restaurant owner Ronnie Havens said.

Mavor Isen said "words were not adequate to express the shock and grief we feel at this time, and everyone in Torrance must feel as I do." He urged that all Torrance citizens observe Monday as "a day of prayer and mourning."

Garden Checklist

1. Lilies may be planted now. Try them in containers as well as in the ground.
2. Plant a cover for your bulb bed. Pansies, violas, many annuals may be planted now for bloom with the spring bulbs.
3. Cut back chrysanthemum plants to about three inches above the ground when they go out of bloom.
4. Plant natives such as ceanothus and photinia now. Winter rains will help to establish the plants and very little water will be needed after that.
5. Plant spring-blooming bulbs. Supplies of most varieties are still available.

took a total of 2,091 books from the library. At the end of the 1962-63 fiscal year the five branches, nearly 90,000 residents had borrowed 554,752 books.

The library is now operated through a contract arrangement with the Los Angeles County Library System. But until 1935, it was a part of the county system. Today, the Library is a municipal property which rents books and services from the county.

MRS. HENDERSON volunteered her time for many years, and for a time her salary was paid by the Dominguez Land Corp. Today, as the library marks 50 years of service, it has expanded its professional staff. The newest member, James Gear, joined the staff only this month.

Since 1961, Harold Umbarger has been chief librarian at the downtown branch. Miss Betty Addison, who was head librarian in 1960, is now the regional librarian, in charge of the whole system.

Asked about the most unusual thing about the library, Mrs. Jamieson said the fact that only four librarians have served during the 50 years had to be the most unusual thing.


