## ECC Drama Instructor Has a Love for Theater

As the newest theater arts instructor at El Camino College, Robert McKinnon brings more than just a passing interest in the field.

"I have been interested in the theater ever since I was a child," McKinnon says. "It's hard for me to remember when I first became interested in it, I feel like I was born with the interest."

McKinnon also brings a wealth of accumulated experience with him to the new position in the theater arts department. His experience dates back to the 1930s, when radio drama was the major form of mass entertainment.

One of the newest members of the El Camino faculty, McKinnon participated on several programs originating from Hollywood during the hey-day of radio drama.

A native of Los Angeles, McKinnon attended Fremont High School, and spent two years at El Camino in the early 1950s. After leaving El Camino, the new instructor earned his degree at the University of Southern California.

He has taught drama in the Los Angeles City School System, and is now teaching technical aspects of the theater and speech arts at his old alma mater.

He prefers the total theater,
