To Help Themselves

Retarded Children Find Helping Hand from SARC

It might be called a PTA. Its members are parents who have had to face a special problem, and who have faced it well.

The members are parents of mentally retarded children, and the PTA is the Southwest Assn. for Retarded Children. The group was formed about five years ago when the Torrance Unified School District and the parents joined together to provide some public education for moderately retarded children.

Since its founding, the Southwest Assn. for Retarded Children (SARC) has worked hard to accomplish many of its goals. First, the retarded children were housed in a single room, then the vacated buildings of the Meadow Park School. Today, the school district operates Columbia School, where special facilities are available, for the retarded.

SARC WAS formed with the help of the Los Angeles Recreation and Parks Department at Lennox Park. It now meets twice weekly and provides exercise and amusements for the retarded. Two weeks ago, the association opened a pre-school

class to help youngsters previously denied admission to Columbia School meet the standards.

Many children who might have been denied admission to the school now enter it at eight years of age and compete successfully in the school's activities and educational program. SARC has two scout troops which have the same kind of activities as any scout troop. The girls, under the leadership of Elizabeth Forehand, do the same things any Girl Scout Troop does, and the boys, under the direction of Charles Spietel, were awarded an honor unit citation for 1961-62.

MONTHLY activities include a friendship dance for teenagers and a full round of holiday parties. Special outings, picnics, and other activities are enjoyed by the children and their parents.

In the future, the association hopes to open a workshop where retarded adults and children can work... even earn some part of their livelihood in some cases. The activity center helps to train many of the people for future jobs.

The group serves the Torrance-Lomita area, the beach cities, the Palos Verdes Peninsula, and the cities of Gardena, Lawndale, Hawthorne, and Inglewood. Many of its charter members are still active. Harold Ritz, former president, is

now chairman of the board, and Mrs. Dean Thurman serves as president. George Barnes, a bailiff in the South Bay Court, is ways and means chairman.

THE ASSOCIATION is a member of the California Council for Retarded Children.

The state and national units are active in the legislatures, helping to put programs for the retarded into law. Federal funds and research have been very helpful to the local group.

Taken together, the goals of the association are simple... they are to provide care and help for the retarded so that someday they may help themselves. SARC has met with great success.

DESSERT PANCAKES ARE popular fare for company menus. Sauces a-flame make them elegant. This sauce is made with boysenberry syrup, highlighted by whole berries which come to you in frozen form.

For Stellar Pancakes Use Heavenly Sauce

Although delicious for any part of the meal, pancakes are a special treat at dessert time when topped with a heavenly boysenberry sauce.

An elegant-looking dessert that can be made flaming with the addition of brandy, these pancakes are easily prepared from a packaged mix.

The sauce, too, is simple to prepare, using boysenberry syrup and whole, frozen boysenberries.

Follow the directions on the package to make the pancake batter. Pour enough batter onto a skillet to make pan-

cakes 4 to 5 inches in diameter. Cook until lightly browned on each side. Remove from skillet and ladle melted butter over each pancake. Roll. Top with hot boysenberry sauce.

For all fruit drinks make honey syrup this way. Mix until dissolved equal amounts of honey and boiling water. Pour in jar. Store in refrigerator.

Peach Flavor Gives New Brunch Idea

"Ginger Peach Sauce" will give new flavor meaning to raised pancakes accompanied by frizzled ham at a weekend lunch or brunch.

For the sauce: Heat a 1 lb. can cling peach slices in their syrup.

Mix together 2 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons cornstarch, dash salt and 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger.

Stir into peaches; cook over low heat until thickened and clear. Serve warm.

To make the pancakes: Scald 1 cup milk. Stir in 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 teaspoon salt and 1/4 cup shortening; cool to lukewarm.

Cover and let rise 30 minutes. Fry on lightly greased griddle, using 2 tablespoons batter for 3-inch cakes and 1/4 cup batter for 5-inch cakes.

Stir batter down as needed. Brush thinly sliced baked or boiled ham with melted butter; heat under broiler or in skillet until edges curl.

Makes about 1 1/2 cups sauce and 12 pancakes (5 inches each) or 24 (3 inches each).

Dip tops of cupcakes in honey and roll in toasted coconut or coarsely chopped nuts.

Turkey Offers Good Seconds

After Thanksgiving eating can be as glamorous as that of the big day if your recipe files contain suggestions for "seconds."

File this recipe for future use.

TURKEY MARSEILLE
1 chicken bouillon cube
1 cup boiling water
3 tbs. butter
2 cups seasoned stuffing mix
8 large slices cooked turkey

1 can (8 oz.) tomato sauce
1/2 cup Sherry

Dissolve bouillon cube in boiling water. Melt butter in bouillon; add 1/2 cup to stuffing mix.

Toss lightly to blend. Place 4 turkey slices in bottom of 8-inch square baking dish; cover with stuffing and top with other slices turkey.

Combine remaining bouillon, tomato sauce and Sherry. Pour over casserole. Cover and bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes.


