





Know Your Traffic Laws

The year 1963 is fast coming to a close with just a matter of 20 days separating us from 1964.

During the first 11 months of this year, 1,220 traffic accidents were recorded on city streets and highways, 742 persons received injuries, and 12 persons have been killed as the result of traffic accidents.

The remaining days of 1963 are hazardous because of the excessive amount of traffic on our streets as the Christmas shoppers make their rounds.

From now until the end of the year, the streets will be crowded with vehicles as well as additional pedestrians. The driving public is urged to use additional care and caution during this holiday period.

THE ACCIDENT rate for 1963 is above that of last year. This is true in the number of persons injured and killed, and reflects the growing use of city streets by motorists.

When one considers the growth of the city as well as the area in general, the added number of vehicles using the streets compared to a few years ago, the additional per-

sons taking advantage of shopping facilities which have been established in the city, and the many other factors that must be considered in traffic accident rates, the 1963 statistics are not so grim as we would first believe.

PROGRESS in the field of accident prevention has been made in Torrance and this progress could only have been made with the cooperation of the driving and walking public.

The Torrance Traffic Safety Council has joined the Torrance Police Department in urging motorists and pedestrians to close out the year by using extreme care and caution while driving and walking.

OBEY ALL rules and regulations that pertain to you as a driver or as a pedestrian and do not allow your temper to diminish your judgment. Be tolerant of your fellowman and be willing to share the roadway. The care and caution you use now may well determine if you spend Christmas at home or in a hospital.

A safe driver is a sane driver.

Law in Action

Every nation has some kind of high court. But our Supreme Court ranks an equal third branch of our government, along with the Congress and the Presidency.

Other high courts may decide the law: But the U.S. Supreme Court must deal with questions which go beyond ordinary law to our governmental policy.

In 1896, for instance, in the case of Plessy vs. Ferguson, the Court said that under the constitution it was permissible for a state to make railroads carry white and colored passengers in separate cars, —if the cars were alike. It said this would satisfy the constitutional requirement of "equal protection of the law."

THE DOCTRINE of "separate but equal" treatment came in time to apply to other things such as schools.

The Fourteenth Amendment itself said nothing about "separate but equal." But some kind of rule had to be made, and the court made the "separate but equal" rule which held until 1954.

Then the Court in 1954 took another look at the issue. In a case called Brown vs. School Board, the Court said that the "separate but equal" rule could no longer do for schools: The very fact of being "separate" made school "unequal." So the court, reversing the Plessy case, ordered public schools to open to all children.

JUST AS the Plessy case applied to things other than to railroads, so also the principle in the Brown vs. School Board case has since been applied to many things besides schools, affecting almost everybody, and changing a social policy in many parts of the country.

If the Court makes decisions which most people disagree with over a period of time, the decisions often undergo change: The Court itself may

reverse itself. Sometimes Congress can change the law to make it constitutional. If not, the people may well amend the Constitution and reverse the decision; a purposely slow and hard process to prevent hasty action.
