All of the griders selected as "Most Valuable" from Torrance high schools also landed all-league positions.





Tribe Wrestlers To Meet Mt. SAC

El Camino College wrestlers will journey to Walnut, where they will compete with Mt. San Antonio College in Thursday.

Coached by Dave Hengstler, the Warriors tuned up for the match by garnering fourth place in the UCLA Inter-collegiate Wrestling Tournament Saturday.

Camino scored 38 points, behind first-place UCLA's 69. Crossmont won second place with 53 points, while Fresno City College and Cal Poly tied for third with 42 points.

Tom McCann, a 133-pound freshman from Aviation, paced the Warriors, winning first place in his division.

McCann defeated four men without a loss to gain the top spot. He defeated Ed Mador of Phoenix, Jim Neal of Pierce, and Bob Jako of UCLA before defeating Joe Bain of Fullerton in the finals.

Rich Tamble, a freshman frob South High won second place honors in the 147-pound bracket.

He defeated Pete Gosselin of Grossmont, Chico Marquez of Fresno but lost in the finals to Dave Hollinger of UCLA.

El Camino baseball coach Chuck Freeman can look forward to the eligibility of at least one player next season.

Combining brain and brawn, Jon Beck, a pitcher from North High, with a 3.67 grade average, was named winner of the Athlete-Scholar award at the El Camino Athletics Award Banquet Friday night in the Campus Center.

Merl F. Sloan, director of student personnel at El Camino, and Coach Freeman combined to make the presentation.

Ken Swearingen, head football coach, presented seven awards to members of the 1963 squad at the Semi-Annual awards dinner.

GARY WETZEL of Lawndale was the recipient of the Outstanding Defensive Lineman award, while being named co-captain of the squad along with Doug Minner of Hermosa Beach.

The offensive lineman award went to John Iacono of Inglewood.

Ralph Hughes, from Hawthorne, the only Warrior named to the All-Metropolitan Conference first team, won the defensive halfback award. Daryl Wilson, from North High, garnered offensive back honors.

HERB HINSCHKE, sure-fingered end from Inglewood, was named outstanding lineman from an all-round standpoint. Defensive halfback Mike Hanchett from Torrance was

named the most improved player.
