The Torrance office is located at 1408 Crenshaw Blvd. It also serves the beach cities, Lomita, Lawndale, Gardena, Harbor City, and the Peninsula cities. Real Estate Board Marks Sales Boom

"The King and I" will be presented at the Harbor College Student Center tomorrow at 7:30 p.m. The color film features Deborah Kerr and Yul Brynner.

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
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Sunday Crossword Puzzle
