Mobile Homes Head South To Enjoy a Balmy Winter

Along with ducks and migrating wild life, thousands of mobile homes are currently rolling south to warmer climates and soon will tie down at trailer park to enjoy a balmy, hurricane-free winter.

The nation's mobile home producers, meanwhile, are busily finishing up what already is a record year: some 152,000 of these homes-on-wheels left factories in the first eight months of 1963, far ahead of the 118,000 produced in 1962 and also topping the all-time peak of 124,000 in 1956.

Today's mobile home carries a price tag of between \$3,000 and \$12,000. And unlike its forebears of the 1950s, it almost certainly has such "fix-ins" as window shutters, pitched-roof porches and a full-size bathroom (sometimes two).

Interestingly, the advance of this way-of-life is bringing a shift whereby the emphasis in words is increasingly on the word "home" and much less on the "mobile."

Manufacturers understandably are happy with the continuing boom in this field. They expect their total sales for 1963 will ring up close to \$800 million on the industry's collective cash register.

GLASS GAINS—The competition in the packaging field for consumer favor is as keen as ever, but glass containers continue to register steady gains. The latest word is that U. S. glass container manufacturers expect another record year, the fifth in a row.

Industry shipments of new glass bottles and jars for 1963 are expected to reach 25.5 billion units, about two per cent higher than 1962, according to the Glass Container Manufacturers Institute (GCM). Dollar

the signal far enough in advance of changing directions to notify other motorists of the movement.

The California Vehicle Code requires all drivers to give an appropriate signal prior to changing the direction of the vehicle. The CVC requires that the signal be given at least 100 feet prior to changing the direction of movement. This signal alerts other motorists and warns them of your plan to turn or change traffic lanes.

THE WARNING is very important on freeways because of the speed at which traffic is moving. As you change traffic lanes, you must remember that traffic to your rear is approaching your vehicle at a fast rate of speed, and that at high speeds, a vehicle forced to slow suddenly may skid out of control.

Most of today's vehicles are equipped with electric directional signals which make giving the required signal easy and handy. If you give a signal every time you change traffic lanes prior to turning, you will find it becomes a habit and you will find yourself using the directional signals automatically.

NOT ONLY will this habit save you from causing a traffic accident, it very well may keep you from becoming involved in an accident yourself.


LONGEVITY — For the first time in their lives, thousands of people this year will receive a Christmas gift guaranteed to last as long as they do. It's a fountain pen made by the Sheaffer people in Fort Madison, Iowa, who refer to it as "the pen so perfect it's guaranteed for life."

Actually, the trademark "Lifetime" was affixed to a fountain pen in 1920, less than a decade after W. A. Sheaffer began commercial production of his revolutionary new invention, the lever-fill pen mechanism. It was revived this year to commemorate the company's 50th anniversary.

Apparently inflation hasn't been a serious factor in fountain pen prices. The lever-fill guaranteed-for-life model of the '20s sold for \$8.75, whereas today's comparable model, with improved cartridge-fill action, is priced at \$12.50.

Since Sheaffer re-introduced the Lifetime pen in March, the company has received hundreds of letters from people who report that their 40-year-old model is still in daily use.

One of the most unique museums that I have ever been in—and I should add—an intensely interesting one—is the Charles W. Bowers Memorial Museum in Santa Ana.

MERTON HINSHAW was just recently elected president of the Western Museums League for a two year period. This past summer he was the recipient of a National Science Foundation grant that sent him to an institute on Anthropology at the University of Arizona.

His biographical material is so varied and full that an entire column should be devoted just to him. Prior to coming to Santa Ana, Hinshaw was curator at the Museum of Natural History in Pacific Grove for eight years and spent three years in the Pathology Museum at the University of California Medical Center in San Francisco.

Take a drive to 2002 N. Main in Santa Ana and enjoy the Bowers Museum—children especially enjoy the exhibits. Closed on Mondays, but open from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. daily and 1 to 5 p.m. on Sundays.

THE MUSEUM was established and built by a trust set up by Charles W. and Ada Bowers. Their two-story frame house stood on the site of the present museum. Many of the trees and shrubs landscaping the Museum remain where they stood in the Bowers' garden.

A most romantic appearance from the outside—and once inside the courtyard with the main museum building facing you, you're absolutely sure that you have been dropped back into the days of the Dons and Donas of Old California—or perhaps even further into the mother-country of Old Spain.

THE CHARM and romance of the Spanish patio and gardens complement the deep historical significance of the exhibits inside. These extensive exhibits cover the fields of history, anthropology, art, and natural history—clothing and equipment of the Spanish pioneers—The largest collection of memorabilia of Madam Modjeska—the arts and crafts of the American Indians—art collections of the American scene and from other regions—minerals, shells and bird-eggs of the world of nature.

The other day when I visited the museum—the entire lower floor gallery was devoted to an exhibition of watercolor painting from the Ford Times. Thirty paintings by noted watercolor artists from all over the country. Upstairs there was a pottery exhibit by Jean and Philip Freeman of Dana Point—also an unusual showing by

Sec. 5.11. Registration of bicycles. The police department upon issuing a bicycle license and license plate as herein provided, shall issue a registration card. The registration card shall contain upon the face thereof the date issued, the name and address of the owner of the bicycle, and a description of such bicycle. The application for registration of such bicycle, on the reverse side of the card shall contain a blank form for the change of ownership.

Sec. 5.12. Records to be kept. The police department shall keep a record of all applications for registration of bicycles, including date of issuance of each license, to whom issued, the number thereof and the date of expiration of the bicycle for which issued.

Sec. 5.13. Stolen, lost or damaged license plates. (a) In the event any license plate is stolen, lost, mutilated or illegible, the owner of such license plate shall immediately make application to the police department for a duplicate license plate. Thereupon the police department, upon satisfactory proof that the original registration card is stolen, lost, mutilated or illegible, and upon the payment of a fee of \$2.50 shall issue such duplicate license plate.

Sec. 5.14. Appointment of deputies. (a) The chief of police is hereby empowered to appoint a limited number of deputies to act as his deputies for the sole purpose of issuing bicycle registration and license plates at designated places. (b) The police department shall employ such persons as are necessary to act as deputies for the chief of police, and their names and addresses shall be provided by the police department.

Sec. 5.15. Removal, destruction or alteration of license plates. No person shall willfully or maliciously remove, destroy, mutilate or alter the serial number on any bicycle license and registered bicycle. Any person who shall mutilate or alter any license plate or registration card while the same is in effect, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor. The police department shall prohibit that nothing herein shall prohibit the police department from numbering frames of bicycles which have no serial number is legible or which serial number is insufficient for identification purposes or for any other identification purpose.

Sec. 5.16. Bicycle dealers' reports. Every person engaged in the business of buying or trading or selling second hand bicycles shall daily make a written report to the chief of police upon forms provided for that purpose by the police department. The report shall include the make, model, year, color, and address of the person from whom purchased, traded or sold by such dealer during the past twenty-four hours, giving the name and address of the person from whom purchased, traded, or sold, to whom sold, a description of the bicycle by name and make, the frame number, license plate number, and the number of the license plate if so found thereon.

Sec. 5.17. Rental agencies. (a) A rental agency shall not rent or offer for rent any bicycle unless it is equipped with a license and a license plate as attached thereto as provided for herein, and such bicycle shall be equipped with the lamps and other equipment required by this chapter, by other ordinances of the city, or by law of the state.

Sec. 5.18. Riding in a group. No person shall operate upon a roadway shall not ride more than two abreast except on paths or places where a greater number of the exclusive use of bicycles. Sec. 5.19. Parking. (a) No person shall park a bicycle upon a public street or roadway. (b) It is permissible to park upon a sidewalk in a rack to support the bicycle or against a building or upon a sidewalk in a manner as to afford the least obstruction to pedestrian traffic.

Sec. 5.20. Riding on sidewalks. (a) No person shall ride a bicycle upon a sidewalk within any business district or upon the sidewalk adjacent to any public school or building, church, recreation center or playground. (b) Whenever a usable path for bicycles has been provided adjacent to a roadway, the use of such path shall be mandatory. Sec. 5.21. Audible signal. No person shall operate a bicycle unless it is equipped with a bell or other device capable of emitting a signal audible for a distance of ten feet, except that a bicycle shall not be equipped with, nor shall any person use, a whistle. Sec. 5.22. Dismount in crosswalk. No person shall operate using a crosswalk to cross an intersection, shall dismount.

Sec. 5.23. Inspection of bicycles. The police department shall inspect, or cause to be inspected, each bicycle before registering the same, shall make certain that each bicycle frame is stamped with the letters "T.R.L." and the license number of the bicycle and shall refuse to register or license any bicycle which does not conform to the above mechanical condition. Sec. 5.4. Application for registration. Application for the original registration of a bicycle shall be made by the owner to the police department. The application forms furnished by the department, and shall contain: (a) Full name, address, telephone, and age of the owner; (b) The full name, address, telephone or number of guardian if the owner is a minor; (c) A description of the bicycle, including the make and serial number.

Sec. 5.5. Inspection of bicycles. The police department shall inspect, or cause to be inspected, each bicycle before registering the same, shall make certain that each bicycle frame is stamped with the letters "T.R.L." and the license number of the bicycle and shall refuse to register or license any bicycle which does not conform to the above mechanical condition. Sec. 5.6. Registration fee and license. (a) A registration fee of \$1.00
