Realtors to Stay Open Tomorrow

Realtors in the Torrance and Lomita areas will remain open until 9 p.m. Monday evening to enable residents who wish to sign the CREA initiative petitions.

Kenneth Peters, president of the Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors, said the CREA hopes to make the Dec. 31 deadline with the 468,259 signatures which are needed to put the constitutional amendment on the ballot.

Decrying the attempts to defeat the initiative voiced by many state leaders, Peters said the petition is simply "petitioning for the right to vote on the housing issue at the general election."

If the claim is denied by the Board of Supervisors, Porter will then be able to enter a suit for damages in Superior Court.

ORDINANCE NO. 1443
AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE AMENDING SECTION 153 OF APPENDIX I OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE 1954 (LAND USE ORDINANCE) TO REFER TO THE SPLITTING AND DIVISION OF LOTS AND PROHIBIT THE CONSTRUCTION OF BUILDING ON ONE RECORDED LOT.

The City Council of the City of Torrance does ordain as follows:
SECTION 1.
The Section 153 of Appendix I of "The Code of the City of Torrance, 1954" is hereby repealed and the following provision substituted therefor to read in their entirety as follows:

1. Splitting lots.
1. Lots or parcels of land shall be split or divided as provided in articles I and II of chapter 26 of this Code.
2. No person shall build or create or place more than one building on one recorded lot which prior to November 12, 1963, could have been divided into more than one lot, each of which resulting lots would meet all the dimensional requirements for the creation of a lot in the R-1 zone; provided, however, that the provisions of this subsection 2 of section 3 shall not apply to:
(a) Buildings designed and used for manufacturing purposes on land zoned M-1 or M-2 and which are occupied and used by one owner; and
(b) Buildings designed and used for commercial purposes on land zoned for commercial uses and which are occupied and used as a part of a shopping center or other integrated operation and the occupiers of which buildings have an easement for vehicular ingress, egress and parking on said lot.

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Schools Pay Utility Bill Of \$106,000

Utility bills are something the average householder often complains about, but a good look at the cost of services supplied to the Torrance Unified School District may cure a lot of complaining.

Since schoof opened, the district has used gas worth \$5,304.95, and that reflects a refund ordered by the California Public Utilities Commission.

Other utilities for the district included: water, \$28,178.67; electricity, \$45,326.63; telephone, \$23,513.26; and trash pick up, \$4,236.
