

Small Battles Being Won in National 'War'

The war against unemployment isn't over by a long shot, but at Harbor College some small battles are being won.

Participating in the skirmish against automation are 21 students, members of a special group receiving training under the Federal Manpower Development and Training Act.

All class members are working men whose skills are no longer needed, or were not being used because of automated equipment. They are training to be stationary engineers and stand an excellent chance of obtaining new jobs after their training is completed.

CLASS MEMBERS are not regularly enrolled students at the college, but use Harbor facilities under their own instructor. During the Christmas recess, while all other students

are away from books and classes, these 21 men continue to study and work toward their goals.

The MDTA class, which began in September with 25 students, meets daily from 8 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. Two of the four departed students left to take jobs in this field. The instructor is Phillip E. L. Goetschek, who has had more than 20 years experience in this field. He took part in the initial planning for the class with representatives of industry, labor, and school officials.

Although not members of the student body, the 21 members of the special class have been invited to attend the student events.

Harvey Reports Stock Dividend

Harvey Aluminum, Inc., has reported sales of \$75,789, 319 for the fiscal year ended Sept. 30. The corporation said net profits were \$5,001,495 for the period, despite a reduction of some 6 per cent in the price of aluminum mill products.

The Board of Directors declared the usual dividend of 30 cents quarterly to be paid Dec. 31 to shareholders of record at the close of business Dec. 12.

Suburban Newspapers Offer Best Coverage of Local News - Survey

Most outstanding reason for a top rating in readership of community newspapers was "the excellent local news coverage not available in the metropolitan press." Facts Consolidated has reported in a survey just completed.

The study was made for Los Angeles Suburban Newspapers, Inc., consisting of a group of nine publications, including The HERALD, whose 52 newspapers reach more than 1 million homes every Thursday.

THE REPORT shows readership, readership and acceptance of the controlled circulation newspapers published by members of LASN, whose function is to provide national sales representation for the group.

Mrs. Dorothy D. Corey, president of Facts Consolidated, delivered results of the

survey to Charles W. Aydelotte, LASN president, with the comment:

"We wish to stress the fact that special precaution was taken to be certain that there was no deviation from the highest professional standards throughout the entire project."

The report will be used on a national basis by Bill Riezi, LASN representative. It includes a detailed explanation of sampling procedure and methods employed to obtain data on which the statistics are based.

Mrs. Corey commented in stressing the high professional standards used throughout the project.

Torrance High School walked off with eight awards at the Southern California Debate League speech contest held Dec. 13 and 14 at Lakewood High School.

Proposals that the County Flood Control District be granted temporary use of a part of the Grace Wright School site in Southwood Riviera created a small storm of protest from homeowners in the area Monday evening.

The Flood Control District, which has about 12 or 15 months work remaining on the Walteria Lake sump, asked the Board of Education for use of about three-quarters of an acre for a construction yard.

Homeowners in the area, worried about the possibility of having to look out the windows of \$35,000 homes at a construction yard, asked the trustees to deny the request. After some discussion, the

trustees were told they could require solid fencing or other measures to keep the nuisance minimal.

When homeowners asked for some time to evaluate the proposal, the board agreed to discuss the matter further with Flood Control District officials.

Board member William Hanson, however, told the homeowners they "should realize the sump is for you, otherwise you would be flooded every winter."

After several short exchanges and proposals for other sites in the area, Board President Bert Lynn told S. E. Waldrip, assistant superintendent of business, to discuss the matter with the county and report to the board as soon as possible.
