# Zone Change Approved by City Fathers

Mrs. Clara Verburg received approval of her request for a change of zone and approval of a precise plan for development of a parcel at 2093 Artesia Blvd., Tuesday evening.

City fathers approved the rezoning of the M-1 property to R-1 and R-3 and approved the plan of development for the area. All barns, dairy yards, and cows will be abated prior to the beginning of construction. Dairy operations must be ended within two years of the start of construction.

In approving the change of zone and the precise plan, councilmen also decided to put up a 7 1/2-foot section of city property adjoining the parcel up for sale.

Both Mrs. Verburg and property owners along Wilton Place have petitioned the city to place the tax-acquired strip up for sale.

# Commercial Zone Control Ordinance Held for Study

An ordinance prohibiting residential uses in commercial zones in the city was tabled Tuesday evening by City Councilmen after discussion of the intent of the ordinance was renewed. The ordinance had been approved Dec. 17 on its first reading.

Bert M. Lynn, addressing the council on the ordinance, said it was "well intentioned," but added it also was "discriminatory and confiscatory." Lynn asked the council to table the ordinance for six months and appoint a citizen's committee to study it.

Councilmen have wrestled with the problem for several months because of growing concern about businesses in the front portion of homes and apartments built in C-2 zones. The C-2 zone permits both businesses and residences, but councilmen fear the increasing number of combined businesses and residences on the same lot.

Following the vote to table the ordinance, Mayor Albert Isen asked City Attorney Stanley Remelmeier to draw up a new ordinance following the council's line of discussion.

The council is apparently seeking an ordinance which would permit both residential and commercial use of the same building only if a conditional use permit is first obtained. Thus, they argue, they can control the growing number of "apartment house businesses." Such an ordinance would apply to all construction in C-2 zones.

# Eight Intersections Get New, Improved Signals

C. E. Seymour has been awarded two contracts totaling more than \$64,000 for modifications to existing signals and installation of new signals at eight city intersections.

The two contracts cover intersections of Palos Verdes and Torrance Boulevards, Prairie Avenue and 190th Street, and Calle Mayor and Palos Verdes Boulevard. Also covered under the contracts are intersections of Crenshaw Boulevard with Sonoma Street, Eldorado Street and Maricopa Street.

Signals also will be installed at the intersection of Carson Street and Maple Avenue, and at the 190th Street entrance to the Garrett Corp. plant.
