PANCAKE DAY

Flip a Cake or Two for Shrove Tuesday

Shrove Tuesday, the day before Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent was so called because it was the day on which "shrift" or confession was made in preparation for the great fast.

In France it was Fat Tuesday; in Germany, Fastentienstag and for the English and some Americans it was and is Pancake Day.

On this day ladies of Liberal, Kansas, and Olney, England run a foot race, each holding a skillet in which she must flip a pancake three times while covering the course.

Olneyites have been pancake racing since 1445 while the Kansans began this contest in 1900; often the English win!

Any day is pancake day when you discover the deliciousness of the many varieties. Try any of these for a change.

- POTATO PANCAKES**
 2 cups grated raw potatoes
 1/4 cup milk
 1 egg, slightly beaten
 2 tbs. flour
 1/4 tsp. baking powder
 1 tbs. grated onion
 1 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. pepper

Assemble all ingredients for grated potatoes darken quickly when exposed to the air so must be combined quickly.

Stir grated potatoes into milk. Add remaining ingredients and combine thoroughly. Drop mixture by spoonfuls into buttered frying pan and

cook slowly until well browned and crisp on both sides. Serve with applesauce.

- COTTAGE CHEESE PANCAKES**
 1 cup flour
 1 tsp. baking powder
 1 tsp. salt
 2 cups cottage cheese
 4 eggs, well beaten
 1/2 cup cream

Sift flour, baking powder and salt together. Mix with cottage cheese. Add eggs and cream and mix thoroughly.

Bake on lightly greased hot griddle, turning only once. Serve with butter and syrup.



Apple Coffee Cake Is First for the Day

For a gala breakfast, add Apple Coffee Cake.

- APPLE COFFEE CAKE**
 2 cups flour
 1/2 cup granulated sugar
 1/4 tsp. nutmeg
 1/4 tsp. cinnamon
 1 tsp. salt
 4 tsp. baking powder
 3/4 cup cold butter
 3 eggs
 1 cup milk
 1 cup thinly sliced apples
 Brown sugar

Sift together the flour, granulated sugar, spices, salt and baking powder. Cut in butter until mixture resembles cornmeal.

Add eggs and milk and stir until smooth. Turn dough into 8x10-inch baking pan and cover batter with apples.

Sprinkle brown sugar generously over fruit. Bake at 350 degrees about 30 minutes.
