

Scouts Release Parade Winners

Top musical units, marching entries, floats, and military entries in Saturday's Boy Scout parade have been announced by Parade Director Ted Olson, activities chairman for the South Bay District of the Boy Scouts of America.

More than 3,000 persons participated in the parade, the second annual event to note National Boy Scout Week. Grand Marshal was Gen. Joseph F. Blehmaier, head of the Titan III project. Mayors of eight area cities attended and presented trophies at the end of the parade.

THE WEST High School band was judged the best musical contingent in the parade. The Los Caballeros Youth Band from the Carson area won the trophy as the best youth band. The 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing Band from El Toro won the trophy as the best military musical contingent.

Explorer Post 785-X, sponsored by St. Catherine Laboure Catholic Church, was judged winner of the best looking float competition. Cub Scout Pack 966-C, sponsored by the

Torrance American Legion Post, won the parade theme trophy with its float.

EXPLORER Post 684-X, sponsored by Pacific Telephone, won the trophy for entering the best specialty Explorer float.

Marching awards were handed out to the best Cub Pack, Scout Troop, and Explorer Post in the parade.

Winning the Cub trophy was Pack 759-C of Manhattan Beach, sponsored by the Pennekamp School PTA of that city.

SCOUT TROOP 154 sponsored by the Torrance Kiwanis Club won the marching trophy for Scouts, and Seascout Ship 713-S of Manhattan Beach, sponsored by the Manhattan Beach Rotary Club, won the Explorer marching competition.

Featured in the parade Saturday were 90 Cub, Scout, and Explorer marching units, 12 bands, and more than 30 floats. Each unit that participated received a "Participant's Ribbon" Olson reported.

Iran, United States Are Compared by SHS Senior

Iraj Zendeheel, a senior at South High, came to the United States three months ago from Teheran, Iran, to study jet engineering. While attending South, he is living with his cousin, Fred Lavi.

Iraj was surprised to find that many Americans think of Iran as only sand and camels. He saw only two camels during his 18 years in Iran, and they were in a zoo.

He says the biggest difference between Iran and the United States is the girls and boys attend separate schools in Iran. Students in Iran take 15 subjects, while a normal South High load is six subjects. Iraj takes trigonometry, physics, algebra II, English IV, government, and physical education at South.

Wrestling is the most popular sport in Iran, but soccer is

very popular, too. The schools have teams, but nothing such as a pep squad to cheer them on to victory.

Iraj's father wrote him of how President Kennedy's death affected Iran. At first, the country couldn't believe that something like that could happen in the United States. After they really realized it was true, the whole country went into mourning.

Deadlines Set Friday For Permits

Parents who wish to send their children to a junior or senior high school in the Los Angeles City School System other than their residence school have until Friday to obtain permits.

Transfer registration, which has been open since Jan. 6, will close Friday even though the spring semester started Feb. 4.

Permits will be granted for those schools which have the capacity to handle enrollments other than their immediate attendance areas. A specified number of students are being permitted to transfer to so-called open schools.

APPLICATIONS can be obtained from principals by parents, and must be obtained at the school to which the student wants to transfer. Schools will be closed as soon as they have reached capacity.

Permits which are granted will allow the student to attend the new school, but city transportation will not be provided. Transportation is the parents' responsibility according to school officials.

In the southwest area, Banning, Carson, and Narbonne High Schools are open. Fleming Junior High School is open, but Stephen M. White Junior High has been designated closed.

Saturday has been adopted as a common registration date by the 14 Little Leagues comprising District 26, administrator Henry Burke has announced.

"A complete effort is currently being made to reach every boy in the district concerning the particulars for joining a Little League team," Burke said.

Leagues within the district include Riviera, Southwood and Tordondo for the Torrance area, Palos Verdes Peninsula and Redondo Beach leagues.

Residential boundaries are established from which every youngster is authorized to participate in the baseball program. Those not familiar with league territories may contact Burke at FR 3-5479 for information.

In addition to residential eligibility, each boy is required

to produce a birth certificate and be accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Boys born between Aug. 1, 1951, and July 31, 1956, are eligible to play.

Youths will participate in tryouts and be assigned to teams of their own caliber of competition. Little League programs are composed of major, minor and farm teams.

Long Beach State College, still very much alive in the 1963 Metropolitan Conference basketball race, invades El Camino College tomorrow evening in a game which could decide once and forever the Warrior's fate this season.

El Camino was 3-5 going into Tuesday's game with Valley College while the Vikings boast a 6-2 record.

Long Beach won a bitterly contested 99-75 decision in the teams' opening round conference encounter behind the 27 points of Mike Waldie and 23 of Romie Hargrove.

A win Friday would give the Warriors more impetus toward finishing in a first division

spot, now that coach George Stanich has conceded the championship. El Camino's top potential would seem to be third place. Even this is becoming farther from reach.

Viking coach Bob Hunt will make his final appearance at El Camino Friday, having announced his retirement earlier this season, effective at the conclusion of the current Long Beach schedule.

Hunt will start forwards Hargrove and Bob Johnson, center George Deering and guards Waldie and Steve Carr against El Camino.


Stanich, in turn, will counter with Clark Canfield and Jim Brennan at forwards, Jim
