Registration for the 1964 contest is about 50 per cent higher this year, according to contest officials. More than 1,500 Southland teenagers have entered the auditions.

## 'Y' Model Legislature Educational

The 16th annual YMCA model legislature was held in Sacramento Feb. 7 to 9 with the motto, "Democracy must be learned by each generation."

About 400 high school boys and girls representing 71 YMCAs throughout the state, took part in this citizenship program.

Each year, the Pacific Southwest Area YMCA council sponsors this event, which follows the same procedure and protocol as the regular legislature. California youths learn the process of government by making government work for them.

Six delegates represented the Torrance YMCA in Sacramento. They were: Jim Griffin, Leslie Gary, Jan Johnson, Paul Schmidt, Gayle Schaffer, and Lane Taylor. The Torrance representatives introduced a bill to establish a 50 per cent minimum for state support in the public schools.

The Torrance bill was tabled in committee and a bill to provide a county-wide tax for the public schools was passed instead. The bill was defeated by the student assembly.

All who participated in this program felt it was a wonderful experience. It brought us a true understanding of government and its workings.
