

Cranston Gets Local Backing In Senate Bid

State Controller Alan Cranston, who seemed to be gaining support of the California Democratic Council meeting in Long Beach yesterday in his bid for endorsement as the candidate for U.S. Senator, had earlier won the support of Torrance and Southwest Democrats, it was reported here.

Leaders of the area Wednesday opened the first headquarters in the statewide movement aimed at drafting Cranston as the nominee for the seat now held by Sen. Clair Engle.

In opening the drive for Cranston in this area, the leaders expressed concern over the uncertainty surrounding the health of Senator Engle. A showdown vote for the support of the CDC is due this morning in Long Beach.

Among those who will serve on the Cranston committee in this area are William Czeleger, Redondo Beach mayor; Fred Mill, division controller of National Supply; E. J. "Chris" Sorensen, Torrance realtor and developer; William A. Cameron, Redondo Beach; Mark Wood, Manhattan Beach; James A. Judge Dalsimer Begins Campaign for DA Post

Superior Court Judge Vincent S. Dalsimer announced his candidacy for Los Angeles County district attorney at a press conference last week and pledged to protect individual rights while leading a vigorous fight against crime.


Dalsimer said the district attorney must take a major role in solving the increasing crime rate but must also "assure that the universally desired goal of a reduction in crime is not achieved by any means repugnant to our democratic way of life."

He said he had discontinued his judicial duties so his candidacy would not conflict with the administration of justice. Dalsimer recently criticized Judge Evelle Younger, another candidate, for continuing his duties in Superior Court while campaigning for district attorney.

DALSIMER also fired a verbal blast at the other announced candidate, chief deputy district attorney Manley J. Bowler for campaigning from his position. He added the opportunities of misusing the office are even greater than those from the bench.

The judge said a number of changes are needed in the district attorney's office in order to fight crime more effectively. He criticized the district attorney's office for announcing investigations before they had begun and for "unwarranted, unfair, and intemperate attacks on the decisions of our trial and appellate courts."

Dalsimer said he would seek support from all political and non-political groups, because the office is of "vital importance to all segments of society."

Paper Bandit Clinic to Be Held by Bank
