Jim Braden Named Head Of ECC Newspaper Staff

SS Requires Report on \$1,200 Wage

Persons who receive social security benefits and are earning more than \$1,200 a year are required to file a report of expected earnings at the beginning of each year, according to Miles Davis, social security district manager, of Torrance. IT PAYS LATER

Parents Urged To Check Teeth Of Youngsters

Dental Health Week has been observed once again throughout the United States for the 16th consecutive year. Though this annual event, which is sponsored by the American Dental Ass., stresses the desirability of proper dental care in childhood, it does so with the adult in mind. For, if teeth are to last the course, they should receive good care, with all that this implies, from the earliest days of childhood. Good dental health generally means better physical health and, in the long run, is also much less expensive than dental neglect.

There is plenty of proof that parents are not alert to the necessity of childhood dental care. According to the findings on children's health that were obtained in the 2-year National Health Survey in fiscal 1959-61, and which were released a short time ago by the Children's Bureau in the publication "Illness Among Children," dental caries (decay) was found to be the most common physical defect in children under 15 years of age.

HALF OF THE children in this age group had never been to a dentist, while a large number of the remaining half were not getting adequate dental care.

Since dental caries is most destructive during the childhood and young adult years, it is not surprising that the average high school student has 10 teeth attacked by decay before he is graduated. Such a bad record makes it understandable that today about 23 million people in the United States have lost all their teeth. It also draws attention to the fact that the national dental bill is almost 2.4 billion dollars annually.

Baby teeth (primary or first) are every bit as important as the permanent teeth. In addition to preserving space for the permanent teeth, they are need for exactly the same reasons: for chewing, for appearance, and for speaking. Providing they are properly cared for, some of the baby teeth may even remain in the mouth until the child is 11 or 12 years old.

DENTAL CARE should begin, it is sometimes said, with the first tooth, and the first visit to the dentist should be made when the child is between two and three years of age. No later than this, certainly, for about half of all two-year-olds have one or more decayed teeth, and it is important that these be filled.

One of the best preventives of tooth decay is the fluoridation of water. Numerous investigations have shown that children who have always drunk water containing adequate amounts of fluoride (1 part per

million) have up to 65 per cent less tooth decay than children who drink water deficient in this chemical.

Some people in Los Angeles County are fortunate since they happen to live in areas where there are natural fluorides in the water. In other areas, the fluoride content is too low to protect against dental decay. Topical application of fluorides to the teeth may be done by the dentist, but is seemingly less effective than having a protective amount of fluoride in the drinking water.

THE KIND OF FOOD that helps prevent tooth decay is not, according to one expert, designed to take all the pleasure out of eating. Though a reduction in sugar intake is urged, the basic diet remains the same as that recommended by nutritionists for good general health.

It has been a long time since the slogan "a clean tooth never decays" was heard throughout the land, but cleanliness is important nonetheless. Proper brushing of the teeth should begin as soon as the child can hold a toothbrush. Proper brushing mornings and evenings throughout life, with a swish of water after meals if brushing is not convenient, will help prevent dental decay and periodontal (gum) disease.

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Garden Checklist

1. Poinsettias you received as Christmas gifts can be set out in a hot, dry spot in your yard. A sun trap. Let them die down and when they start to show signs of new growth, cut them back to about 6 or 8 inches from the ground.
2. Get with the bareroot things. Time grows short—roses, fruit trees, berries, grapes, spiraea (usually in gallon cans but sometimes bareroot), artichokes, rhubarb.
3. Bedding plants will be flooding the market. Get the seedlings while young and fresh from good growers only.
4. Now is an excellent time to start new lawn or renovate the old one. Start feeding your established lawn now.
5. There are all kinds of wonderful started bedding plants ready for your garden now. If you haven't had a vegetable garden recently, remember how wonderful those fresh vegetables tasted and then head for your nearest nurseryman.
