### Mme. Nehru Will Lecture At El Camino

Madame Rajan Nehru, wife of Ratan K. Nehru, the secretary general of the ministry of external affairs, and cousin of India's Prime Minister Nehru, will speak tonight at 8:30 p.m. in the Campus Theater at El Camino on "The Changing Face of India."

Madame Nehru, long active in the welfare, educational and cultural activities of her homeland, is a founder-member of the Indian Conference of Child Welfare and presently serves as president of the Delhi Youth Welfare.

Official posts currently held by Madame Nehru include president of the National Indian Federation of the United Nations and president of the Delhi Red Cross; chairmanship of the Indian National Theatre and vice-chairman of Bharatiya Kala Kendra. She is a member of the standing committee of the All India Woman's Conference and served as editor of "Roshni," the organization's office journal.

Madame Nehru came to America in 1948 when her husband was appointed minister and charge d'affaires in Washington, D.C. At that time she traveled widely in the United States, lecturing at universities and taking part in seminars and discussions on radio and television. She was awarded a prize by the Press Club of New York for speaking on "India, the New Democracy."

Though welfare and educational projects absorb most of Madame Nehru's time, her lifelong interest is history, politics and social science. These interests are reflected in her interpretations of the changes that have taken place in India over the past decades.

## Science Complex OK'd

Final plans and specifications for the new Industrial Arts and Science complex at Torrance High School were approved Monday night by the Board of Education. Plans were previously approved by the State Division of Architecture.

The \$1.1 million project will be put to bid today, with bids scheduled to be opened April 14. The Board of Education will award the contract at its meeting April 20.

The project will be financed out of bonds under the last bond election. The district will have about \$500,000 remaining before the legal bonding capacity is reached.

The new complex, latest in the master plans for Torrance High, will provide nearly 3,000 pupil stations. The buildings will be ready for occupancy sometime next year, according to S. E. Waldrip, assistant superintendent for business.

Torrance High is expected to have an enrollment approaching 2,000 when the complex is completed.

### Youngsters Take Tests In Schools

Testing programs designed to identify academically talented students in the Torrance schools have been completed, according to Dr. Louis Kaplan, assistant superintendent of special services.

Dr. Kaplan said 104 children were identified as academically talented youngsters out of 156 who took the tests. The identification rate was better than 66 per cent.

Average I.Q. ratings for the 156 who took the test were 136.14. The intelligence test scores ranged from a low of 101 to a high of 172.

## Harbor General Names New Medical Director

Dr. Benjamin J. Cutshall has been named medical director at Harbor General Hospital, effective this week, according to hospital administrator A. L. Thomas.

Dr. Cutshall has been acting medical director at the hospital since last January when Dr. Dirk teGroen was named medical director at the newly opened El Cerrito Hospital for geriatrics in Long Beach.

At the same time, Thomas announced the appointment of Dr. George C. Porter as assistant medical director. Dr. Porter has been a staff doctor in the hospital's receiving room.

DR. CUTSHALL has been with the department of charities hospital service since 1954. He served his internship and residency at Los Angeles General Hospital, then joined the staff of the hospital. He moved to Harbor General Hospital in July, 1960.

A veteran of the Navy in World War II, Dr. Cutshall completed pre-med studies at Santa Monica City College and the University of Notre Dame. He attended the University of Colorado Medical School.

He practiced privately in Watsonville after the war and served an overseas tour of duty with the Army during the Korean conflict. He re-entered private practice in Santa Monica prior to joining the county service.

Dr. Cutshall and his family reside in Santa Monica.
