

El Camino Nine to Host Easter Tournament

Warrior Horsehidiers Rip Wobbly Santa Monica City

El Camino College will move up a notch in horsehide competition during Easter Vacation, hosting UCLA, Loyola and San Fernando State in a four-team tournament that begins tomorrow.

The Warriors have steamrolled into a 4-0 Metropolitan Conference record and figure to do well against the four-year schools. In pre-season action, Camino beagued out a 10-6 win over UCLA.

Camino mentor Chuck Freeman has tabbed Torrance High chucker Don Coil to open on

the mound tomorrow at 11 a.m. against the Bruins.

Coil was named the Pioneer League's Most Valuable Player at Torrance last year.

In the second round of the tourney, San Fernando State will tangle with Loyola at 2:30 p.m. tomorrow. Both games will be played on the Warrior diamond, off Manhattan Beach Boulevard.

Two former Torrance athletes led Camino to its fourth consecutive conference win Friday afternoon. North's John Beck picked up the mound de-

cision and South's Jim Berry banged a grand slammer as Camino handed Santa Monica a 14-4 licking.

BECK STARTED and went five frames for the Tribe, picking up his fifth win of the year and his second in conference action. He has been beaten only once.

The Camino sophomore allowed three earned runs on six hits and four walks while fanning nine batters.

Jack Ropley relieved Beck and finished the contest, allowing only one run on three hits, and two walks while striking out two men.

EL CAMINO'S biggest blow came in the seventh frame when Berry led a six-run Warrior uprising by belting a 385-foot home run into left field with the bases full.

The Warriors also picked up six runs in the initial frame. Three hits, three walks, a wild pitch and a triple by Beck accounted for the early Camino damage off starting Samo hurler Dan Waldinger.

Camino picked up a run in the third inning via a hit batsman, a passed ball and three walks. In the sixth, the Tribe tallied again on a walk, a single, an error, and a single by Ken Balch.

WILDNESS was a key factor in the Warrior win. Santa Monica chuckers gave up 12 walks and an equal number of hits.

The Warriors have now beaten East Los Angeles Bakersfield (twice) and Santa Monica. Camino played two games yesterday against Long Beach.

After a week's break from conference competition due to Easter Vacation, the Warriors will return to action against Los Angeles Valley on Friday, April 3. The following day the Warriors will host San Diego in a doubleheader.




