A generation ago, the people knew that the best double play in baseball was "From Tinkers to Evers to Chance."

We must never leave to "Chance," our public transportation or busses. No Political Game must be made of them, while losses pile up evidence that "it is in the public interest" to sell them.

Everywhere you go, you hear desires expressed for good, fast, efficient, direct bus service. The need will be even greater in view of our world-wide Transportation Fair to be held at Torrance in 1951. Never was the need greater for the downtown Torrance merchant to have better direct bus service from outlying areas to the shopping district, than now.

A competent accounting on each individual line will show that small busses of station wagon size will be needed on all except the peak runs.

There is no profit for the community in having good transportation to take the folks out of town while local patrons have poor service to go shopping in Torrance.

The essentials of human existence are food, clothing, transportation and shelter. The essentials for a happy, healthy growth of acity with Torrance's advantages, are good homes, schools, churches, hospitals, paved streets, lights, sidewalks, business, job, industry, public buildings, parks, play grounds, recreation centers and PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION.

For your protection you must have good city government for on them you depend for so many services, including among others police, fire, health, recreation, parks and playgrounds, street department, legal, judicial, legislative and BUS TRANSPORTATION.

I am an automobile man and my truck and bus experience make bus transportation stand out as THE GREATEST ESSENTIAL TO EVERY WORTHWHILE ACTIVITY OR THING.

I hope to be elected by you to the City Council of Torrance on April 11th. I would appreciate one of your votes. If elected, I pledge to do all in my power to furnish better bus transportation to the people at a minimum of cost, and to endeavor to have installed an accurate accounting system showing cost, and income, of each individual bus route.

Mr. William J. B. Hughes, after a referendum petition had failed, some years ago brought a suit as a taxpayer, to stop the sale of your municipal bus lines. He carried it to the Supreme Court where it was held that public interest and necessity to sell the lines was not shown. The sale was stopped.

A good many people have stated that Torrance residents are entitled to better local bus service even though a loss were incurred in so doing. I agree that better bus service is deserved. The City Manager's report published in the Peninsula Press, showed over \$63 per day or 30c per mile income from each of the busses in daily use. This \$63 per day should show a profit. Proper accounting is the first essential.

Mr. and Mrs. Torrance Voter, you have in your hands the power to vote "NO" on Proposition No. 10 which would lose your bus franchise and "NO" on Bus Sale Proposition No. 1, which authorizes Council to sell the lines.

"From Thinkers to Evers . . ." but don't let it go to "Chance."
