Rugmaking Class Open At Seaside

A new, free class in rugmaking at the Seaside School, Sharynne Lane in Seaside Ranchos (off hiway 101 in Torrance) will start on Monday night April 10, at 6:30.
Designed especially to help women furnish new homes and refurbish old ones at low cost, Wilma Johnson the instructor will help each woman in her home - furnishing or gift - giving campaign. Since 3 x 5 rugs are now in popular use, the class will feature these as furnishings for bedrooms, dens, bathrooms and playrooms. Those who want a more ambitious undertaking can make an elaborate 9 x 12 woolen braided rug.

INSURANCE PAYMENT FOR VETERANS IS EXPLAINED

Veterans' National Service Life Insurance dividend payments by the Veterans Administration will go automatically to beneficiaries of record where the veterans who died had insurance in force at the time of death, a VA spokesman said today.
No application will be required in such cases, according to VA. If the insurance was not in force at the time of death, however, the dividend will be paid to the veterans' estates. Payment will be made through the administrator of the veterans' estates, it was said. If there is no administrator, payments will be made directly to persons who are entitled to veterans' estates. Inheritance laws of the states in which veterans were legal residents at the time of death will govern each case, VA said.
Where the GI insurance had been allowed to lapse, claim forms will be sent by the VA to those persons found to be entitled to all, or a share, of the veterans' dividends.
Payments of dividends in behalf of deceased veterans will begin soon, VA said. These are expected to be substantially completed by June 30 this year.

VOTE "NO" ON AMENDMENTS and PROPOSITIONS

Our Charter is our City Constitution. It may be amended if our Council deems it proper and votes to have the necessary amendments placed before the people for approval. To amend the Constitution requires careful thought.

Most of the presently proposed amendments are denied authorship by individual Councilmen. There is little active sponsorship of these amendments by any one. It is said that some "were copied from Redondo Beach." The general attitude of the present Council toward its proposed laws is of mild interest, at best.

The amendments and proposals were hastily written. Only a month ago the swimming pool bonds had to be taken off the ballot because improper drafting made the bonds unsalable, even if the people had approved.

Two amendments shock and amaze the Directors of the Democratic Club:

(A) Amendment 9 gives the Council the power to license "lawful games." Since draw poker is "lawful," it would appear that the Council is asking the voters to let the Council license draw poker.
We cannot understand why the people should vote on this issue again. If our people inadvertently approved this amendment, and changed the present Charter which specifically prevents the licensing of card games, would some one then be "shaking down" the Gardena gambling monopoly?

(B) Amendment 11 does not require the City Attorney to devote full time but allows him to conduct his private law practice. Amendment 11 proposes to add a Deputy City Attorney who shall be hired by and fired by the City Attorney. He also shall serve on a part time basis.
At the present time the City Attorney receives the highest salary every paid a City Attorney by this city. He also receives free office rent, free utilities, free secretary, and free law library. Amendment 11 will add free legal aid.
We do not think the City should have an assistant City Attorney until a full time City Attorney is required. Then, if the work is too much for one man, an additional City Attorney may be considered by the Council, upon recommendation of the Civil Service Commission, without need for Charter Amendment.
We remember the days before Civil Service when incumbent city officials could count on a solid vote from city employees and their families "or else."
We resent placing positions out of Civil Service and suggest that if the City Attorney should be protected, then the deputy City Attorney should have the same security.

CONCLUSION
Since at least two measures were passed upon favorably by the Council but which, if passed by the people, would result in grave wrong, we cannot but distrust the balance of the offering. The sample ballot does not show the original Charter. We feel that the safe vote is a "NO" vote.
Until the offering Councilmen will individually, publicly and privately back their proposals, the City must not change its Constitution.
The Democratic Club of Torrance has but 225 dues-paying members and does not endorse candidates in non-partisan elections. However, when it or its Board of Directors fear that something else than careful consideration is given by Councilmen in passing or proposing laws for our city, we shall speak out to the public at large in the future as we have now.
While we feel there is merit in paying \$100.00 per month to Councilmen, still, the manner in which these amendments and propositions have been offered requires our recommendation to be "NO" on all.


