## PAUL HELD NAMED EL CAMINO ATHLETE OF YEAR

Paul Held, outstanding triple-threat athlete from Redondo Beach, was today named El Camino College's "Athlete of the Year." Held was unanimously chosen by the college coaching staff and H. J. Sheffield, director of student personnel.

Presentation of the award will be made before the student body at the annual spring awards assembly on Thursday, June 2.

Held was chosen on the basis of his outstanding performances in three major sports this season. He played football, basketball, and baseball.

As first string quarterback Held effectively piloted the Warrior football squad through its most successful season to date. His heads-up signal calling and sharp passing was a strong factor in making the locals a conference threat. The Camino eleven dropped only three games in the entire season and came within one touchdown of upsetting the Metro conference champions, East Los Angeles.

Held started the casaba season on the junior varsity, but got his chance with the varsity when George Naumann was injured. He proved a strong asset to Coach John Morrow's casters by scoring 112 points from his forward post.

Last year Held was named to the 149 All-Metropolitan conference baseball squad for his brilliant work at first base. This season he was switched to first string right field. Despite a .239 batting average for ten conference games, Held's long swatting was one of the main reasons why the Warriors captured their initial Metro loop baseball title. He was co-captain of the team.

Held entered El Camino in the spring of 1949 and so has one season of eligibility left in both football and basketball.

Nine other El Camino athletic stars were considered for the annual award. They are George Allen, who took two firsts in the National Junior College Swimming Meet and also played outstanding water polo; Ron Skrifoff, football; Jayvee basketball; and track; Jim Cline, basketball; and baseball; Hugh Corrigan, basketball; Harold Hakman, track; Ray Carver, football and track; Jerry Melvaine, baseball; Jim Sears, football; and Ed Kennedy, basketball.

In 1948, winner of the athlete of the year was Bill Peters of Inglewood, who was captain of the football team, played basketball, and competed in track. Bob Hughes of El Segundo, named on the All-American Junior College swimming team, was the selection last year.
