
John A. Howard Elected to PV College Office

John A. Howard has been elected vice president of Palos Verdes College by the Board of Trustees, according to Dr. Richard P. Saunders, president of the Rolling Hills institution. Mr. Clinton D. Regelin has been elected assistant secretary.

John Howard attended North Shore Country Day School, Winnetka, Illinois, and Princeton University. He holds the baccalaureate and master's degrees from Northwestern University, leaving Northwestern to enter the armed services with the U. S. armed forces in Germany, after which he became superintendent of an occupational army unit school in Germany.

He is one of the founder of Palos Verdes College and is Dean of Students there. How-

ard's father, Hubert E. Howard, is chairman of the Munitions Board of the Department of Defense.
Clinton Regelin holds baccalaureate and master's degrees from Northwestern. He was a personnel officer, 7th Infantry Division, educational and vocational advisor at the University of Kansas City, and a member of the faculty of the school of education, Northwestern University. He is assistant to the president at Palos Verdes College.
