(Continued from Page One) but we wanted to make sure. The boundary of Torrance on Western avenue is 174th street, no matter where the police traffic jurisdiction belongs.

MIDDLE However, we find the matter of who is going to give you a ticket on Western avenue is quite a muddle. This is the way it goes: The west side of Western avenue from 174th street to 182nd street is in Torrance. The east side is in Gardena. Police traffic jurisdiction we are told by our own Chief Stroh, belongs to the Sheriff's department at Lennox.

From 182nd street to 190th street, the police traffic jurisdiction belongs to Los Angeles Police Department, while the west side still is in Torrance and the east side of Western is in Los Angeles.

From 190th street to 213th street, the police traffic jurisdiction belongs to either Los Angeles or to Torrance, by "gentlemen's agreement."

From 213th street to 238th street, Torrance traffic officers have jurisdiction over the west lane and Los Angeles over the east lane.

Sure is a mix up, isn't it? WHO GETS WHO? Let's dream up a hypothetical traffic accident on Western avenue at about 182nd street, and see what happens: There is a drunk driver traveling down Western avenue north of 182nd street (Sheriff's jurisdiction). He hooks the fender of a car (still Sheriff's jurisdiction) and bounds off the street on the east onto private property and knocks over a fence and a tree in front of a home (Gardena's jurisdiction), and decides to get out, so he backs his car away and goes through the signal at 182nd street and Western avenue against the red light and rams another car (Los Angeles jurisdiction). Then his car bounds out of control on the west side of the street and onto private property where his car hits a bystander (Torrance jurisdiction).

What's going to happen to that poor man? No matter what happens to him, the north city limits of Torrance on Western avenue is 174th street and not 190th.

(Continued from Page One) board that such appointments be kept to a minimum as a result of the advantage secured by an incumbent under temporary appointment or the loss of time spent in training, should the temporary appointee not qualify or should more qualified candidates become eligible for appointment.

"d. Emergency appointments: Appointments made to prevent stoppage of public business, and may be made without reference to any existing eligible list. Appointments shall not have a duration of more than thirty (30) working days during which compensation is earned, and only one such appointment may be given any individual in one calendar year.

"Appointments shall be made by the Superintendent subject to approval of the board.

"All present employees in positions subject to this statement of policy who have been employees for a period of six months or longer at the time of adoption of this policy shall be deemed to have regular status; and those who have earned less than six months in the service of the board shall have probationary status until they shall have served six months, when they will achieve regular status.

(Continued from Page One) ing area of Torrance spends now more than \$1,000,000 a year in retail stores, has been cancelled by the farsighted votes of Mayor Bob Haggard, Councilman Nick Deale and Councilman George Powell.

This \$1,000,000 in business will not come to Torrance unless it is invited here, it is pointed out, and one way to invite the business is to run the buses up there frequently. It even has been suggested that every third or fourth Los Angeles bus might make the run to Hollywood Riviera, further popularizing the Los Angeles run and making the local end of it pay. At present, residents of that area have to take the long, round-about P. E. line to Los Angeles.

The Harbor City, Harbor Hills line abandonment is being held in abeyance temporarily.

"These lines will not be junked, nor sabotaged by those who want to get rid of them," said one patron who is preparing to press for good management and improved schedules.

"The bus lines belong to the people and they must be operated for the benefit of the people."
