WARRIORS TO PLAY ORANGE COAST FRIDAY

Coach Amby Schindler's El Camino grid charges, fresh from an upset win over a favored Warrior alumni eleven, will come to grips with a powerladen Orange Coast Junior College pigskin squad this Friday night in the new Warrior bowl at 8 p.m.

Both squads have a pre-season game under their belts, and with the usual first game jitters worked out of their systems, they should tangle on even terms in this non-conference game.

The Pirates from Costa Mesa breezed of an easy 40 to 0 triumph over a weak first year Valley grid contingent, while the Caminitos struggled to a hard fought 13 to 6 victory over the old timers of the school.

All-conference halfbacks Paul Hernandez and Larry Willoughby plus veteran quarterback Orville Thredgill spark a high-powered offensive Costa Mesa boys, and the trio accounted for three touchdowns in their first outing.

Coach Schindler will be relying on his new found scatback Don Miller and bonecrushing fullback Ron Skrifoff to carry the offensive load for the Blue and Gray cause. Paul Held and Don Young will be counted on to guide the Warrior eleven to victory from their quarterback position. Veterans Don Jurk, Ray Carver, Dick Donges, Dick Cortrite, Dick Oafinger will be the mainstays in the Camino 'forward wall.

Warriors Defeat Alumni

El Camino's varsity football team, sparked by the fine running of halfbacks Don Miller and Joe Ballante, scored two touchdowns in the second quarter then held the alumni eleven to a single score in the third period, to capture a 13 to 6 verdict in their initial performance of the 1950 campaign last Saturday afternoon in the El Camino bowl.

The teams felt each other out in the first period, with neither squad being able to hold the ball long enough to open up a sustained drive, although penalties and a fumble halted two varsity drives which might have gone the distance.

Miller, Ballante strut

The varsity's first touchdown came midway through the second period when Len Edwards, alumni quarterback, punted poorly on fourth down, the pigskin being downed on the alumni 48-yard line.

It took just four plays to tally. Righthalf Ballante swept left end

for 12 yards. Lefthalf Miller smashed 22 yards to the alumni 15 yard line. Then, after Ballante blasted through tackle to the 10, quarterback Don Young dumfounded the entire alumni squad by circling right end to score on a bootleg play un molested. Dick Turner's conversion attempt failed.

Stock Car Championship at Carrell's Sunday

Late model stock cars will stage a special championship race at Carrell Speedway's sensational new one-mile Road Race course Sunday afternoon, September 24, it was announced by racing director Bill White.

Eric Erickson, head of the stock car racing association, said he expects practically every popular make and model of post-war car to be in the gruelling race over the winding "pretzel" shaped course.

Erickson will drive a Pontiac, Andy Pierce, a Buick and Ben Gregory, a 1950 Lincoln.

After receiving the kickoff, the alumni started a push which seemed destined to go all the way. With Socko Torres and Cece Schmeckle doing the ball packing, the alumni marched from their own 30-yard marker to the varsity's 18 yard line. There the drive bogged down. On fourth down and 10, quarterback Bill Peters tossed a desperation pass intended for Jim Adams in the end zone. However the pass fell short and was picked off by Ron Skrifoff who proceeded, behind beautiful blocking, to outrun the entire alumni team and go 81 yards to score as the half-time gun sounded. This time Turner's placement was true.

Alumni Score

The alumni eleven came onto the field after intermission, determined to score. And score they did. About halfway through the quarter, following several punting exchanges, the alumni began to roll. Dick Contreras returned a Don Young kick to his own 34-yard-line.

When it appeared the varsity line would repulse the onslaught, a 15-yard penalty for roughing it up gave the losers new life on the varsity 45. Irv Gustafson ate-up 11 yards in three tries.

Payoff Pitch

At this point quarterback Jerry Witt faded back ten yards and southpawed a high lob pass to end Marty Acosta, who gathered the ball in on the 5-yard stripe and skirted into the promised land. The play covered 34 yards. Les Kazarian's extra point try sailed wide.

Leading players for the varsity eleven were end Don Jurk, the best linesman on the field, tackle George Peltier from Leuzinger, and halfback Don Miller from Washington high, destined to become one of Camino's all-time great running backs. For the alumni halfback Socko Torres and quarterback Jerry Witt were the bright lights.

In the matter of statistics, the alumni outgained he varsity 187 yards to 137 both in running and
