**1950-51 Chest Goal to Include Armed Force Aid**

The 1950-51 campaign goal for the Community Chest of the Los Angeles area is \$7,602,343 for 155 Red Feather Services, including \$300,000 for services to the armed forces.

The goal was announced by Herman F. Hahn, general campaign chairman, who said this sum is \$937,583 more than was raised last year, and that it will call for a higher standard of giving on the part of everyone.

Sharing in the decision on the goal figure was the Torrance Community Chest campaign committee headed by Dean L. Sears, campaign chairman, who reported that it is the consensus of the local committee that production in Torrance can be increased approximately 20 percent over the 1949-50 campaign.

"For three years," Sears pointed out, "the Community Chest has fallen short of the goal needed to meet the needs created by

the tremendous increase in population, and this year's campaign organization is determined to get the increased contributions necessary to meet this minimum goal."

This year's goal will provide for continuation of existing services, inclusion of services for the armed forces, and critically needed expansion of services such as:

1. A very limited increase in patient days care for children in need of hospitalization and more patient visits for children and adults to medical clinics that now, unless the need is most acute, must remain on waiting lists.
2. Sufficient staff in mental health clinics to help reduce the waiting period which is now as much as three months for children and adults in need of treatment.
3. More prompt service for a waiting list of children from broken homes for placement in foster homes, and to provide greatly needed facilities now lacking for foster day care.
4. A very limited amount of critically needed additional field service for youth serving agencies in areas where need is most acute.

**Cal Realtors To Convene at Santa Cruz**

Plans for the annual convention of the California Real Estate Association to be held this year in Santa Cruz have been completed according to an announcement received by James H. Schmitt, president of the Torrance-Lomita Realty Board, from F. H. Lakey, president of the statewide association.

An extensive program will begin on Monday, October 2 and run through Friday, October 6. According to early estimates, approximately 2300 realtors from 130 local real estate boards throughout the state will attend.

Wendell Hards, prominent realtor of San Pedro has been appointed a member of the state wide resolutions committee. A very important one in this convention.

Among leading realtors of this community who expect to attend the convention are Pery L. Connett, Edith H. Smith and James H. Schmitt.

It is expected that this will be the most intensive program of activity ever brought to a realtor's state convention. It includes heated debate on highly controversial issues to appear on the November ballot and upon which recommendations will be made.

**Red Cross Offers First Aid Course**

Meeting requests of residents of this vicinity for training in the skills and techniques of First Aid, local Red Cross leaders today announced the organizing of a class to start September 28—from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m., each Thursday.

The group will meet at Torrance High School, 2200 Carson Street and upon successful completion of the course, will be awarded Red Cross certificates.

The training of men and women in first aid has been stamped by the National Security Resources Board as one of the chief responsibilities for Red Cross in civil defense planning.

These classes are geared to prepare citizens for self help and to be of help to others in times of any emergency, local Red Cross leaders stated.

**Typewriter Repair Course At Harbor IC**

A new employment-preparation class in Typewriter Repair is being offered in the extended day program at Harbor Junior College, according to Mr. Harold A. McCarter, coordinator of the extended day program.

The new class, which offers two units of college credit, meets from 6:30 to 9:30 p. m., each Tuesday evening at the local college. Students desiring to enroll in the new class can do so in the class itself on Tuesday, September 19.

Mr. Glenn Crozier, typewriter repairman for the U. S. Army in the Los Angeles area, will be the class instructor.

"The new Typewriter Repair class is open to all persons interested in preparing for employment in this field, and to those already in the field who wish to develop a wider range of repair skills," Mr. McCarter stated.

**Audio-Visual Classes at Harbor Tech**

A University of Southern California extension class in Classroom Use of Audio-Visual Materials will be offered at Harbor Junior College this semester, according to Raymond J. Casey, director.

The new course, required of all applicants for basic teaching dentials, will meet in the library building of the local college on Wednesday evenings from 7 to 10 p. m., beginning September 27. The classes, listed as Education 477, will offer two units of college credit, and will be taught by Lloyd Harmon, director of the Audio-Visual department at Harbor Tech.

Registration for the class and payment of fees will be accomplished at the first meeting of the class on September 27, Mr. Harmon stated.

**Audio-Visual Agreement with L.A. County**

At its meeting of Sept. 19, the Torrance Board of Education entered into an agreement with the Los Angeles County Superintendent of Schools to furnish audio-visual materials of instruction to the Torrance Unified School District.

Entered into for the fiscal year 1950-51, the cost of the audio-visual materials of instruction will be \$937.50.
