Led by two speedy halfbacks, Don Johnson and Al Kirkland, Bakersfield's Junior college footballers are awaiting the invasion of the El Camino Warrior varsity this Friday night.

Bakersfield rolled over their first two opponents by scoring four touchdowns in each game. Kirkland, the right halfback, scampered for two TD's, one of them for 60 yards, as they opened the season with a 27 to 18 triumph over the College of Sequias. Johnson and Larry Moore accounted for the other two scores.

Johnson got off sparkling 80 and 90-yard runs as he led his mates to a 26 to 13 win over Glendale City college last Friday. Moore and Jim Lager each tallied once to assist Johnson in the scoring.

The Warriors of Camino will be aiming to add the Renegades to their list of victims as they send their big gun backfield of Don Young at quarterback, Gary Van Vliet and Don Miller at the halves, and Ron Skriffliff at fullback against the hosts.

The Caminotes have won all three of their games to date by two touchdowns to one. The scores were 13 to 6, 13 to 7, and 12 to 7, with Don Miller being outstanding on offense and Ron Skriffliff the defensive star.
