 As head of the Los Angeles Life Guards Mr. Stidham has had a great deal of experience with first aid to victims of accidents and sudden illness and he is a capable instructor.
 There is no charge for this instruction and everyone who has the time should take advantage of this course in first aid. Even if never bombed, there are many times when someone is injured in accidents around the home and on the highways and it would save lives if someone is present who is trained to render immediate and temporary first aid to the patient until a physician can arrive to take charge of the victim.
 A trained First Aider is less apt to have an accident himself or herself as this training teaches the individual to be careful.

New Food Contract

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 negotiated into the food contract for the first time provides for a period of arbitration before there can be a strike over any grievance which involves interpretation of provisions of the contract, Selover said.
 The health-welfare clause is "frozen" in the contract for three years at \$2 per week. While details remain to be worked out, it was reported that the money will be paid direct to the insurance company, which will be one of national standing, selected by the employers and the union. Trustees from the union and employers will administer the fund. The plan covers regular clerks and regular extra clerks who work more than 20 hours a week, it was said, and will provide group life, disability, accident, sickness, medical, and hospital benefits for the food clerks and their families.

New Record Enrollment at Adult School

The October average daily attendance of the Torrance School of Adult Education has far exceeded any in the history of the school's operation, according to Donald Manashaw, Director of Adult Education.
 Now enrolled in 33 diversified fields of vocational, leisure-time, business, and technical training are 1,155 adults. The October, 1949 figure showed an enrollment of 781, compared to the present October enrollment of 1,155.
 Accounting for this rapid expansion is the addition of a wide variety of popular subjects, including mixed chorus, atomic first aid, home planning, jewelry making, public speaking and parliamentary law, toy making, and additional dressmaking classes.
 No fees of any kind are charged for admission to these classes and adults, regardless of residence, may attend them.

World Fellowship Week Celebrated By Local YWCA
