Forward Jim Cline, playing his last cage tussle for El Camino prior to entering the Navy, turned in a brilliant farewell exhibition of basketball skill last Saturday night as he tallied 26 points and led his mates to a 61-35 victory over a scrappy Valley five.

On the preceding night the Warriors also racked up a Metro conference win against East Los Angeles, 66-43, in the Garfield high gym. Bob "Flip" Flanagan and Cline harassed the hoop for 33 points between them. Against Valley Cline played a bang-up game, with 24 of his 26 digits coming via the field goal route. He amassed 14 points in the hectic second-half Warrior spurge.

Although the locals led all the way, they did not catch fire until the second half, following a drive by Valley which narrowed the score to a 29-28 Warrior advantage. At that point Cline, Bob Chambers, and Jack Turner, sparked by the brilliant floor play of Cline, turned on

the gas and all but ran the visitors off the floor. In the last ten minutes the Caminoans outscored the Monarchs 32 to 7.

In the East Los Angeles game "Jumping" Jack Turner fairly sparked under the backboards, bringing down the majority of Brave rebounds. Peppertop Willy Shea also turned in a top-notch performance, repeatedly stealing the ball from the hapless East Los Angeles Huskies.
