\$1,850,000 Harbor City Tract Begun

Construction of a \$1,850,000 tract of 184 homes at Western Ave. and Lomita Blvd., in Harbor City has been started by Lakewood Properties, Inc. Original plans for the tract was for 84 homes at a total cost of \$850,000 announced Howard Lawson, property manager for Lakewood Properties.

Only 84 homes will be in the first section of the tract, and an additional 100 homes will be built in the entire development. The houses, almost all three-bedroom, are priced to sell at from \$9000 to \$10,000.

Lawson said that the 84 homes are now under construction on a 20-acre parcel of land.

According to Lawson, the company plans to extend President Ave. from Harbor City through the tract, for six blocks to serve the homes. Presently, the street ends at Lomita Blvd., the south boundary of the tract.

Lawson said the company is absorbing the expense of extending a storm drain on President Ave. for more than 1000 feet and at a cost of \$27,500 to serve the new homes.

When the child is absent and no excuse is given therefore, the state does not reimburse the school system and money must be taken out of the local taxpayer's dollar.

As Torrance's Solon of attendance and absences, Warren W. Hamilton, Director of Child Welfare and Attendance, Torrance Unified School District says, "Parents, write a letter—even a very simple one telling why Johnny is absent. Send it to the school and just give the reason. The word 'headache' will be sufficient, or the word 'stomachache' or 'bad cold' or 'sore throat.'"

"Your writing the simple note to Johnny's teacher or principal will put dollars in your pocket and will help save the future of your child. Schools will know when and where he is, and that will be double protection for him and for you."

persons per every new dwelling unit, according to Blaine Walker, executive secretary. Most planners feel that 3.5 persons is closer to the average family size of those moving here during the past year. This would put the current population at near 30,000. The U. S. census taken last April gave the city a population of 22,201.

Torrance's estimated assessed evaluation is \$48,506,400 and puts the weekly pay roll at \$700,000 according to officials.

Ten years ago, according to the compilation, the city had a population of 9950 and an assessed evaluation of \$20,33,285.
