(Continued from Page One) necessary and most of the merchants I've talked to agree with me. Wherever there are parking meters, certainly there's parking space, because people don't come to shop if they're going to have to buck meters. Also, I don't think people ought to be taxed to park on the streets of Torrance. They're public streets."

Installation of parking meters is like charging shoppers a "toll" tax for parking. Hal Mellen, of Photo Arts Studio, declared, Mellen said: "I don't like the idea of paying to park on a public road. That was my first reaction to the idea as a shopper in other towns I've been to that have meters. The streets are supposed to be granted for "free" travel. Installation of parking meters is like charging a "toll" tax. Most people don't like the meters. Everywhere I've seen them, in other parts of the country, the people have disliked them, and in many instances have succeeded in having them removed."

Several merchants charged they were given the well-known "double-cross" by passage of the ordinance without being given a chance to protest it. They said that they had been assured that the parking meter ordinance would not come up for consideration at the meeting on July 24.

The Press had exclusively predicted that it would, and despite the assurances by members of the City Council and the City Manager that it would not be on the agenda, the ordinance was presented and adopted for the first reading.

When asked why the Council does not spend some of the \$339,000 surplus in fund balances to buy parking lots, instead of installing meters to get revenue for their purchases (a questionable source, at that), Mayor Bob Haggard called the fund balance report "newspaper talk, from one newspaper." The attested statement of fund balances is printed elsewhere on this page.

Mrs. Kenneth Shephard, of 750 Border Ave., said this about the meters: "I don't like them. It makes shopping inconvenient."

A. S. Thompson, of 1418 Engracia Ave., said: "When I go to a town where there's parking meters, I avoid them."

Words of protest were on the lips of nearly every citizen, householder or merchant alike, and the merchant group will be joined by many other individuals in protesting the parking meter ordinance when it comes up for final reading at the Council meeting on Aug. 14.
