### 100 Changes Auto Laws Now Effective

Motorists face nearly 100 changes in the California Vehicle Code with amendments and revisions effective last Saturday, the Automobile Club of Southern California reminded drivers in releasing a partial roundup of the new laws.

Among more important changes, it was pointed out, is the one making it mandatory for motorists to come to a complete stop when meeting or passing school buses with flashing red lights.

Automobiles must remain at a standstill until the flasher ceases, indicating that students have finished entering or alighting from the bus.

**SLOW DRIVERS**  
Another change involves drivers proceeding at less than the normal speed of traffic—regardless of established speed limits. They must drive in right-hand lanes at all times unless overtaking other vehicle or preparing for left turns.

After Saturday, all motor vehicles and trailers must be equipped with fenders or similar mudguards that will minimize any splashing to the rear. And all cars will be required to have at least one red or amber stop-light on the rear.

**NEW DRUNK DRIVING CODE**  
Some other changes listed in the club's roundup include: second conviction in seven years for drunk driving will result in a one-year suspension of operator's license with no reinstatement until proof of financial responsibility is furnished; false or fraudulent car theft reports will be a misdemeanor, and television sets in cars will be taboo if the screen is visible to the driver.

p.m. to Saturday at 9:30 a.m. This class is composed of the youth of Torrance. Classes are under the supervision of Rod White and was proved very successful last year.

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
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
