to two dozen or more letters. All protested the approval of the variance. Petitions stated that "Establishment of such a concern would be a nuisance in that dust would prevail throughout the neighborhood, real estate values would automatically decline within a considerable radius and the danger to children, who would inevitably play at the diggings would be extremely great. Such a mill should not be situated between two residential districts such as Walteria and Palos Verdes Estates." According to reliable sources, the location of the proposed gravel pit would be the old French Quarry, which has been out of operation for the past several years.

Hidden Death Takes Toll Says Jaycees

Torrance Junior Chamber members this week, urged residents to continue in their campaign against "Hidden Death" in an automobile. Here are some common causes for accidents which should be guarded against:

- 1. Every year it takes its victims. You can't see it or smell it.
- 2. Sometimes you are warned—by headache, dizziness, blurred vision, nausea or hard breathing. In small quantities drowsiness may be the only symptom.
- 3. Carbon monoxide reaches you through loose floorboards, leaky gaskets in the exhaust manifold, open muffler seams, short exhaust pipe, uncapped oil filler vent, exhaust gases drawn in by the fan from cars ahead. Be Safe!
- 4. Garage Doors — Never run the engine with the garage doors closed.
- 5. Ventilation — On the road it is better to open the cowl ventilator than side window for fresh air.
- 6. Exhaust System — Report any exhaust leak promptly for repair.
- 7. Resting — Never run engine when resting or sleeping in the cab of a standing vehicle.
- 8. Exercise — Whenever you feel sleepy or groggy, stop the truck or car, get out, and walk around.
- 9. First Aid — Move anyone suffering from carbon monoxide into fresh air. If breathing has stopped, apply artificial respiration at once. If you don't know how, ask your boss today.
