

Police Schedule Two Shows Sat. Night at Local High School

Tickets are disappearing fast for the annual Torrance Police Show, according to Chief John Stroh. The affair which includes 10 professional vaudeville acts will be held at Torrance High School this Saturday evening. All proceeds will be used in youth work.

Two shows are scheduled—one for seven o'clock and one for nine.

Tickets may be purchased from any police officer, it was disclosed. There are 30 men and two women in the department at present according to Chief Stroh.

Admission for adults is \$1.25 and \$1.75 for children. It was announced that the orchestra for the vaudeville show will be under the direction of Jack Aronson for the 14th consecutive year.

The acts include Billy Nelson as master of ceremonies. He is well-known both on radio and screen as well as the stage.

The ten acts are as follows: The Pina Troupe, an acrobatic act; Aubrey, a magician; Madison's Dog, lots of tricks; Bud Taylor, "Cannon Ball" of Western Pictures; Armando and Lita, humorous act that will land you in the aisles; Nelson and Knight, another comedy team;

Student Protests Sewer Annexation Without Success

Supervisor Raymond V. Darby announced the approval by the Board of Supervisors Tuesday of annexation to the 166th St.-Prairie Ave. Sewer Maintenance District of the area from Ingwood Avenue to Arlington Avenue between Redondo Beach Blvd. and Compton Avenue.

In addition, the annexation will also take in Alondra Park and the El Camino Jr. College. Only one protest, received from James Cornell opposing the assessment, was denied because the Supervisors were convinced of the overall benefits to efficiency of maintenance and administration, Darby said.

Cornell pointed out that the older districts would be paying additional taxes for the newer districts which he considered unfair. Cornell is a chemical engineering major at El Camino Junior College.

Supervisor For School Buses Hired

A revolution is about to take place in the handling of the school bus situation. The Board of Education at its Tuesday meeting this week unanimously went on record in favor of hiring a bus supervisor.

In a detailed study of other districts presented to the Board, Superintendent of Schools J. H. Hull, pointed out that transportation is a specialized job, and the only way to solve the problem permanently rests upon "hiring a man to fill this position."

The original bus problem was called to the attention of the Board when irate parents invaded the Board of Education complaining that lower grade youngsters had to walk across open fields, through heavy traffic, and over railroad tracks.

Although the Board did not seem to be favorable to picking up the youngsters outside of the mile and a half limit, they reversed this opinion at a later meeting.

After listening to the parents, four of the five Board members favored a compromise on the problem.

The Board ordered a detailed study of the bus controversy. The recommendation and approval of a bus supervisor to cope with the situation is the Board's answer to the parents' request. It will be up to the supervisor to eliminate the difficulties once he is hired, Hull reported.
