"Adam and Fall of Man," to Be Church Text

The perfection and majesty of God's creation is contrasted with the dream of mortal existence in the Sunday Lesson-Sermon on "Adam and Fallen Man" in all Christian Science churches.

One of Paul's declarations in his letter to the Ephesians is the Golden Text: "Ye were sometimes darkness, but now are ye light in the Lord: walk as children of light . . . proving what is acceptable unto the Lord" (5:8,10.)

On this subject Mary Baker Eddy says in "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures": "The great truth in the Science of being, that the real man was, is, and ever shall be perfect, is incontrovertible; for if man is the image, reflection, of God, he is neither inverted nor subverted, but upright and Godlike" (p. 200.)


